

The 26th meeting of the Executive Council was held on 11th September 2017 at Central University of Punjab, Bathinda. The following members were present:

The Chairman, EC and Vice-Chancellor, Central University of Punjab extended a warm welcome to the members to the 26th Meeting of Executive Council and thanked them for sparing their precious time for contributing towards the academic growth of the University and for their valuable guidance.

The Chairman, EC then requested the Secretary, EC to present the Agenda Items one by one to the members for deliberations and decisions/recommendations. The Secretary presented the Items in sequence.

Item:No:EC:26:2017:1

To confirm the minutes of the 25th meeting of Executive Council held on 17th July 2017.

The Secretary, EC informed that the draft minutes of the 25th meeting of Executive Council were circulated to all the members of the Executive Council on 23rd July 2017.

As no comments/suggestions on the minutes were received, the Secretary, EC requested EC to confirm the minutes.

Further, part modifications in Item:No:EC:25:2017:22 was approved by members through circulation, making the rule; *“if a student of passing out batch could not clear examination of Semester-IV and have re-appear, such student(s) may be allowed only one special chance to give reappear examination in summer break, provided such student(s) do not have any other backlog of another Semester”* applicable for current students also.

RESOLVED

The Executive Council unanimously RESOLVED to confirm the minutes of the 25th meeting of the Executive Council held on 17th July 2017, along with above partial modifications in Rules for Master’s Degree Programme.



Item:No:EC:26:2017:2

To consider the Action Taken Report (ATR) on the decisions of 26th meeting of the Executive Council.

The Secretary, EC informed that the 25th meeting of the Executive Council was held on 17th July 2017.

Subsequent to the circulation of final minutes, the concerned Centers/ officers/ officials implemented the decision taken by the Executive Council in its 26th Meeting.

The Secretary, EC presented the details of the actions taken as placed at *Annexure-26.1*.

RESOLVED

The Executive Council unanimously RESOLVED to confirm the Action Taken Report on the decision of the 25th meeting of the EC held on 17th July 2017.

Item:No:EC:26:2017:3

To consider report on the progress of the University by the Vice Chancellor.

The Vice Chancellor presented his report in form of a presentation briefing the Council about the progress of the University, after the last meeting of the Executive Council held on 17th July 2017.

The details included status of cumulative student strength vis-à-vis previous years, filled positions (both teaching and non teaching) w.r.t total sanctioned positions, research projects at CUPB and academic collaborations with research and educational institutions

The Vice Chancellor also informed that during his recent visit to China under INSA Bilateral Exchange Programme, MoUs with two institutes of the Chinese Academy of Sciences viz. - Xishuangbanna Tropical Botanical Garden, at Xishuangbanna and Kunming Institute of Botany in Kunming. Both are in Yunnan Province were signed.

Further, it was informed that under Distinguished Lecture Series of Ministry of External Affairs, Shri Ashok Sajjanhaar, Former Diplomat, delivered a lecture on 'Indian-Central Asia Relations: The Emerging Partnership'.

Another lecture 'Importance of Lokpal' was delivered by Justice S.K. Mittal, Lokpal and Former Chief Justice, High Court of Rajasthan.

One day regional workshop on "Prime Minister's Fellowship Scheme for Doctoral Students" sponsored by SERB-DST was held in association with CII. Dr S. S. Kohli, Advisor of the Ministry of Science and Technology and Prof. Samir K. Brahamchari, former DG, CSIR and Dr. Shalini of CII delivered lectures.

The University organised Yoga Week which culminated in celebration of International Yoga Day on 21st June 2017. National Handloom Day was celebrated on 5th August 2017 on 8th August 2017, University took pledge for a New India, to commemorate the 75th



anniversary of Quit India Movement. The 71st Independence Day was celebrated this year at the Main Campus, followed by tree plantation drive. The Vice Chancellor also informed that as a part of 75th year Quit India Movement, University, as directed by MHRD, organized a Rock Concert titled "Yeh India Ka Time Hai" on 4th September 2017. Swastik Band from Chandigarh performed during the event.

It was also apprised that National Youth Parliament was organised at University under the aegis of Ministry of Parliamentary Affairs on 9th September 2017. Shri Avinash Rai Khanna, Former member, Rajya Sabha graced the event by his presence. The event was also webcasted live.

The presentation concluded with explaining the status of construction works ongoing at the Main Campus of the University.

RESOLVED

The Executive Council unanimously RESOLVED to accept the report of the Vice Chancellor with appreciation and expressed satisfaction over the progress made by the University after its 25th meeting i.e. after 17th July 2017.

Item:No:EC:26:2017:4

To consider the case of Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon for appointment to post of Associate Professor in the Centre for Education.

Brief History

The Secretary informed the EC that Central University of Punjab, Bathinda advertised various teaching positions including the post of Associate Professor in Centre for Education vide Advt. No. 17/N1-01 (2016). Following *Essential Qualifications* were mentioned in the advertisement:

"For Professors, Associate Professors, and Assistant Professors:

As per "UGC REGULATIONS ON MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS FOR APPOINTMENT OF TEACHERS AND OTHER ACADEMIC STAFF IN UNIVERSITIES AND COLLEGES AND MEASURES FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF STANDARDS IN HIGHER EDUCATION 2010" and the 2nd Amendments to the regulation issued in June 2013.

Please note that Ph.D. + NET in relevant field will be the minimum eligibility condition for Assistant Professor.

For Centre for Education

For faculty position for Centre for Education NCTE 2014 regulations will be applicable for the M.Ed. programme whereas "UGC regulations on minimum qualifications for appointment of teachers, 2010" will be applicable for M.A. (Education) programme.

The qualifications for the post of Associate Professor (for M.Ed. Programmes), as per NCTE Regulations 2014, is as under:



- (i) *Postgraduate degree with minimum 55% marks in the discipline relevant to the area of specialisation.*
- (ii) *Postgraduate degree in Education (M.Ed./M.A. Education) with minimum 55% marks.*
- (iii) *Ph.D. degree in Education or in the discipline relevant to the area of specialisation.*
- (iv) *Any other qualifications prescribed by UGC like NET qualification or length of professional teaching experience as per UGC or state government norms for the positions of Professor and Associate Professor*

Further, in UGC Regulations, 2010 following common qualifications have been prescribed for the direct recruitment to the post of Associate Professor:

Para 4.3.0:

- i. *Good academic record with a Ph.D. Degree in the concerned/allied/relevant disciplines.*
- ii. *A Master's Degree with at least 55% marks (or an equivalent grade in a point scale wherever grading system is followed).*
- iii. *A minimum of eight years of experience of teaching and/or research in an academic/research position equivalent to that of Assistant Professor in a University, College or Accredited Research Institution/industry **excluding the period of Ph.D. research** with evidence of published work and a minimum of 5 publications as books and/or research/policy papers.*
- iv. *Contribution to educational innovation, design of new curricula and courses, and technology – mediated teaching learning process **with evidence of having guided doctoral candidates and research students.***
- v. *A minimum score as stipulated in the Academic Performance Indicator (API) based Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS), set out in this Regulation in Appendix III.*

After combining qualification mentioned in NCTE Regulation, 2014 and UGC Regulations, 2010, a candidate must possess following qualifications to be eligible for the direct recruitment for the post of Associate Professor:

- (i) *Postgraduate degree with minimum 55% marks in the discipline relevant to the area of specialisation.*
- (ii) *Postgraduate degree in Education (M.Ed./M.A. Education) with minimum 55% marks.*
- (iii) *Ph.D. degree in Education or in the discipline relevant to the area of specialisation.*
- (iv) *A minimum of eight years of experience of teaching and/or research in an academic/research position equivalent to that of Assistant Professor in a University, College or Accredited Research Institution/industry **excluding the period of Ph.D. research with evidence of published work and a minimum of 5 publications as books and/or research/policy papers.***
- (v) *Out of the eight years of experience mentioned at Sr. (iv), **must have a minimum of three years at the M.Ed. level.***
- (vi) *Contribution to educational innovation, design of new curricula and courses, and technology – mediated teaching learning process with evidence of **having guided doctoral candidates and research students.***



(vii) A *minimum score as stipulated in the Academic Performance Indicator (API) based Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS), set out in this Regulation in Appendix III.*

The Secretary added that as per UGC Regulation 4th Amendment, there is a **consolidated API Score requirement of 300 points from categories II & III of APIs (Cumulative).**

Item Under discussion.

The Secretary, EC told the Council that in response to Advt.No. T/NT-01(2016) Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon applied for the post of Associate Professor in Centre for Education. Qualifications and Experience mentioned in his application form is as given below:

Dr. Dhillon also mentioned following experience in his application form:

In application form under "Research Guidance" column, Dr. Dhillon mentioned that 04 M.Phil. students have completed their degree under his supervision. He has also mentioned that 02 Ph.D. students are under his supervision but they are yet to complete their degrees. However, no documents supporting his claims were found attached with his application form.

The applications received for the post of Associate Professor in Centre for Education by the CUPB were forwarded to the concerned Screening Committee and Core Committee.

On first screening, the above committee found Dr. Dhillon as '**Not Eligible- Experience less than 8 years based on PhD certificate**'.

In the meantime, the University issued three corrigenda due to updating of vacancies, eligibility conditions and arrival of 4th amendment to UGC Regulations, 2010. In the 3rd corrigendum the last date for applying online was extended upto **26th August 2016.**



In response to this corrigendum, Dr. Dhillon updated his API form, wherein he mentioned under para (III) D Research Guidance of API form that 04 M.Phil. Degrees awarded under his guidance and no Ph.D. is either awarded or submitted thesis under his supervision.

The applications were again screened by the same committee and the committee declared Dr. Dhillon as 'Provisionally Eligible, subject to submission of proof of PhD supervision'.

As per practice, the list of eligibility status of the candidates with remarks was displayed on the University website, and objections were invited from the candidates up to 31st December 2016. In response to the eligibility status displayed on website, Dr. Dhillon submitted scanned copies of some documents which indicate that:

- i. Dr. Dhillon is supervisor of three students of Ph.D in Education, Central University of Punjab (date of letters 5.1.2016, 25-02-16 & 27.05.2016).
- ii. The recommendation of the Departmental Research Committee (DRC) of Department of Education, CDLU, Sirsa held on 28th October 2015 at 01:00 PM. Minutes of the meeting state that:

"Item No. 2: Considered the applications of Mr. Gurpreet Singh and Mukesh Kumar regarding allocating Co-supervisor to them. It was unanimously resolved that Co-supervisor, Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon, Assistant Professor, Centre for Education, Central University of Punjab, Bathinda may be approved."

- iii. Minutes of PGBOS of Department of Education, CDLU, Sirsa, on the same day i.e. 28th October 2015 at 2:00 PM, the meeting of PGBOS of Department of Education, CDLU, Sirsa held. In the minutes of this meeting in the section "**Any other Item**" at No. 4, it is mentioned that:

"Considered and approved the cases of Mr. Gurpreet and Mr. Mukesh Kumar Ph.D. scholar and the minutes of DRC held on 5th October 2015 under the item no. 02 (Considered the applications of Mr. Gurpreet Singh and Mukesh Kumar regarding allocating Co-supervisor to them. It was unanimously resolved that Co-supervisor, Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon, Assistant Professor, Centre for Education, Central University of Punjab, Bathinda may be approved.)"

It is to be noted that PGBOS is recommending authority whose recommendations are approved by the AC (Competent Authority).

The above letters were considered by the Screening and Core Committees. This time Dr. Dhillon was considered Eligible. Being eligible, Dr. Dhillon was called for interview scheduled on 11th March 2017 for the post of Associate Professor in Centre for Education.



The Secretary of the EC CUPB, further informed that after receipt of the invitation for the interview, Dr. Dhillon on 28th February 2017, sent an email to the Recruitment Cell attaching following two documents:

1. Letter dated 27th February 2017, issued by registration branch of CDLU to Mr. Gurpreet Singh (PhD Scholar, Deptt. of Education, CDLU) conveying the approval of Academic Council in its meeting held on 15th February 2017 to the recommendations of DRC, PGBOS&R, regarding appointment of Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon as their Co-supervisor.
2. Certificate of submission of PhD Thesis by Mr. Gurpreet Singh (PhD Scholar, Deptt. of Education, CDLU) under Co-supervision of Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon on 7th February 2017. The certificate was issued on 28th February 2017 by the Chairperson, Department of Education, CDLU, Sirsa.

After interviewing, the duly constituted Selection Committee recommended appointment of Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon as Associate Professor in Centre for Education. The confidential selection proceedings of this Interview were put up in sealed envelope before the Executive Council in its 24th meeting held on 20th March 2017. ***The Council stressed that the appointment letters to the selected candidates be issued only after re-verification of all the eligibility criteria, in respect of the recommended candidates. In the event of any discrepancy, the matter be brought back to the Executive Council.***

From above facts it was noted that:

1. Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon has submitted the documents which show that he was supervisor of 03 Ph.D. scholars and co-supervisor of 03 Ph.D. scholars before the last date of advertisement i.e. 26th August 2016. However, no Ph.D. thesis was submitted under his supervision before the last date of advertisement. As per documents provided by Dr. Dhillon, the first Ph.D. thesis was submitted under his co-supervision on 27th February 2017.
2. As per documents provided by Dr. Dhillon, the Registration Branch of CDLU conveyed to Mr. Gurpreet Singh (Ph.D. Scholar, Deptt. of Education, CDLU) the approval of Academic Council in its meeting held on 15th February 2017 to the recommendations of DRC, PGBOS&R regarding appointment of Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon as his Co-supervisor. The letter was issued on 27th February 2017. On the same date i.e. 27th February 2017 Ph.D. Thesis of Mr. Gurpreet Singh was submitted under Co-supervision of Dr. Dhillon. The certificate was issued on 28th February 2017 by the Chairperson, Department of Education, CDLU, Sirsa. In the minutes of PGBOS, there is no mention of the name of the other supervisor. This type of approval (not competent to approve) and hiding the other name is unusual.
3. The copy of the minutes of Departmental Research Committee submitted by Dr. Dhillon indicates that DRC (recommending Dr. Dhillon as co-supervisor) was held on 28th October 2015 whereas in the copy of minutes of PGBOS&R mentions that it was held on 5th October 2015.

Accordingly, the decision of Executive Council in the 24th meeting, vide Item:No:EC:24:2017:6 to refer the case of Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon for appointment as



Associate Professor in Centre for Education was referred back to the Screening Committee for re-verification of the eligibility criteria. The recommendations of the Screening Committee were presented in 25th meeting of EC.

As per eligibility conditions given in Clause 4.3.0 (iv) of UGC Regulations, 2010 for the post of Associate Professor, *the candidate should possess evidence of having guided doctoral thesis*. However, as per the re-verification report of Screening Committee and the documents available in Recruitment Cell/Personal File of the candidate, the EC noted that from the documents submitted by Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon, vide email dated 28th December 2016, it is evident that no Ph.D. thesis had been submitted under his Supervision before the last date of receipt of online applications (i.e. 26th August 2016). The first Ph.D. thesis was submitted on 27th February 2017 under his Co-Supervision, with **his wife (Dr. Ranjeet Kaur)** in Chaudhari Devi Lal University as Supervisor.

The Secretary, EC also brought to the notice of the EC that a letter was received from Dr. N.K. Sharma, Hanumangarh (Raj.), marked as confidential and addressed to the Vice Chancellor, on dated 12th July 2017. He had forwarded a notification dated 12th May 2017 of Central University of Jammu to support his letter. The notification at S.No 6 shows Dr. Dhillon as **not eligible** with "*Proof of submission of Ph.D. thesis is after last date of submission of application form. Thesis submitted under Co-supervisor on 22nd February 2017*". The Executive Council was of the opinion that the contents of the letter needs to be examined.

The Secretary, EC added that Executive Council in its 25th meeting in light of above fact and the letter received from Dr. N.K. Sharma, dated 12th July 2017 challenging the selection of Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon for the post of Associate Professor in the Centre for Education, constituted the following three member Committee to investigate and make recommendations:

1. Prof. Aswani Kumar Mohapatra, School of International Studies, JNU, New Delhi
(External Member) {Chairman}
2. Prof. S. S. Marwaha, Coordinator, Centre for Applied Agriculture, CUPB
3. Prof. Anjana Munshi, Coordinator, Centre for Human Genetics & Molecular Medicine, CUPB

The Committee met at Delhi on 29th July 2017. Its report placed in a sealed cover was opened by the EC in the meeting held on 11th September 2017.

As per the report,

"The Committee examined the following documents in detail:

- i. *Re-verification report of the Screening committee*
- ii. *Record provided by the recruitment cell of the CUPB*
- iii. *Complaint filed by Dr. N.K. Sharma, Hanumangarh (Rajasthan) dated 12th July 2017 challenging the selection of Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon for the post of Associate Professor in the Centre for Education.*

After going through documents/record the committee unanimously concluded the following:



1. As per the documents submitted by Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon, vide email dated 28th December 2016, it is evident that **no Ph.D. thesis has been submitted under his supervision** before the last date of receipt of online application (i.e. 26.08.2016). The first Ph.D. thesis was submitted on 27th February 2017 under his Co-Supervision. However, as per his application form, he was guiding six Ph.D. students.
2. Registration branch of Chaudhary Devi Lal University (CDLU) by its letter dated 27th February 2017, conveyed to Mr. Gurpreet Singh (Ph.D. Scholar, Dept. of Education, CDLU) the approval of Academic Council, in its meeting held on 15th February 2017, to the recommendations of Departmental Research Committee (DRC), Post Graduate Board of Studies and Research (PGBOS&R) regarding appointment of Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon as his Co-supervisor. On the same date i.e. 27th February 2017, as per record Ph.D. thesis of Mr. Gurpreet Singh was submitted under Co-supervision of Dr. Dhillon. **These scanned copies documents were provided by Dr. Dhillon on 28th February 2017, through email, whereas the interview was scheduled to be held on 11th March 2017.**
3. Another anomaly was noted in the fact that the copy of the minutes submitted by Dr. Dhillon indicate that DRC recommending Dr. Dhillon as Co-Supervisor was held on 28th October 2015. However, in the copy of minutes of PGBOS&R it is mentioned to be held on 5th October 2015. This discrepancy in the dates of the meeting of DRC creates doubts about the authenticity of the documents submitted by Dr. Dhillon.
4. As per available record of establishment, Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon has not taken any permission from the University regarding co-supervision of Ph.D. students of CDLU Sirsa.
5. Item No. iii was noted.

In the view of above, the committee was of opinion that Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon was not eligible on the last date to apply for the post of Associate Professor, Centre for Education, on the grounds that he did not have experience of having guided candidate for research at doctoral level. Here the term 'guided' mean awarded (at least one) of Ph. D. degree of the students under supervision."

The EC also noted that Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon served a legal notice to the University on 9th August 2017 (**Annexure 26.3**). Vide which the advocate said that "Under the present, compelled circumstances a legal notice of 15 days, from the date of issue, is hereby served upon you for the issuing of the appointment letter or indicating the reasons for delay for issuing of a letter to my client failing which my client will be forced to knock the doors of appropriate courts to claim all kinds of losses at your cost and to seek justice. You will be responsible for the consequences thereto".

The Council also noted the reply of University in this regard (**Annexure 26.4**) in which it was submitted that as per the Central Universities Act and Statutes, the appointing and rejecting authority for all class A posts is the Executive Council of the University. The Executive Council can appoint a person or refuse an appointment. Therefore, no single officer, be it Vice Chancellor or Registrar, can appoint or deny an appointment to an individual. It was further informed that the approval/decision of Executive Council would be communicated to the candidates.



The Secretary EC added that on 18th August 2017, University wrote a letter to Dr. Dhillon seeking clarification of becoming Co-Supervisor of CDLU students. He was asked whether he had taken prior permission from CUPB for guiding a Ph.D. student of another institution as Co-Supervisor. He was also asked to clarify the anomaly in date of DRC as recorded in PGBOS&R minutes.

In response to the clarification Dr. Dhillon has not given any reasonable reply. In his reply dated 28th August 2017, he has submitted that *"It is a matter of record that I have not taken any permission from the CUPB for Co-Supervising Mr. Gurpreet Singh, Ph.D. student of Chaudhary Devi Lal University, Sirsa and neither I have submitted any paper of CUPB in this regard. The screening committee has not raised any point on this issue as well but it is clarified that this matter relates to C.D.L.U., Sirsa which was supposed to seek permission from CUPB prior to my nomination as co-supervisor of Mr. Gurpreet Singh if it was necessary."*

He further added in the end of his reply, *"In the last I want to bring it on record that on 17/08/2017, my self was called by the Registrar, Dr. Jagdeep Singh to meet him in his office. I went to his office around 3:30 p.m. for meeting and in the very beginning of meeting he explained that as one of my well-wishers he was suggesting and advising me that I should withdraw the legal notice at the earliest as the administration is very much annoyed with me due to this legal notice and may take some disciplinary action against me and even my selection may be got quashed from EC of CUPB. He thus advised me not to go to the court as court will be of not much help to me. He further suggested and advised that if I will go by his advice then the administration will consider me for adjustment in the next selection process which will be taking place in 2-3 months' time after re advertisement of the post of Associate Professor."*

The Registrar and Secretary, EC explained that Dr. Dhillon came to his office by seeking prior appointment and was not called by the Registrar. Registrar gave him advice that this time his eligibility for the post of Associate Professor is in doubt and in the next advertisement he will be fully eligible. He further advised him not to send such kind of legal notices to the University. However, the Registrar never commented anything about his selection. In his reply dated 28th August 2017, Dr. Dhillon has distorted the facts of his meeting with the Registrar.

One day before the 25th EC meeting he sent a request to the Chairman EC for giving him a personal hearing in the EC meeting. The Chairman read the request letter before the members. The request was denied by the EC as the EC does not hold court. The Secretary EC also informed that it has come to the notice of University that the guide of the student for whom Dr. Dhillon was Co-Supervisor, **is wife of Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon**. It has also come to the notice of the EC that almost all research publications of Mr. Dhillon are with his wife.

The Chairman also discussed that in past University has allowed some candidates to appear in interview who did not have the proof of having guided Ph.D. thesis. The EC deliberated it at length and **RESOLVED that any mistake got committed earlier is not expected to be repeated even after detection. Instead it has to be rectified as soon as possible.**

RESOLVED

The Executive Council, after detailed discussions on the recommendations of committee, unanimously RESOLVED, to accept these recommendations that Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon was not eligible on the last date to apply for the post of



Associate Professor, Centre for Education, on the grounds that he did not have experience of having guided candidate for research at doctoral level. Here the term 'guided' mean awarded (at least one) of Ph. D. degree of the students under supervision.

Further as per Statute 18 (5) of the Central Universities Act, "if the Executive Council is unable to accept the recommendations made by the Selection Committee, it shall record its reasons and submit the case to the Visitor for final order." The Executive Council, accordingly, FURTHER RESOLVED to submit this case to Visitor for final orders.

Item:No:EC:26:2017:5

To consider appointment of part time counsellor/clinical psychologist.

The Secretary informed that the IQAC in its 6th meeting held on 10th February 2017, while discussions, suggested that '*A part time counsellor/clinical psychologist may be appointed by the University to look after the mental health of the students.*'

The Chairperson added that the University has students from all over the country. The students from far flung states face language and cultural barriers while their stay in the University. Such circumstances along with climatic differences may bring about psychological changes in the students. It is recommended that the suggestion of IQAC may be considered and a part time counsellor/clinical psychologist may be appointed by the University to look after the mental health of the students.

The member discussed the issue in detail.

RESOLVED

The Executive Council, after deliberations, RESOLVED to approve the appointment of part time qualified counsellor/clinical psychologist as consultant on part time basis for 3 hours a day, with maximum emoluments of Rs. 30,000/- per month fixed.

Item:No:EC:26:2017:6

To consider the selection criteria for the post of STA/TA, Driver and Cook.

The Secretary informed that University released advertisement Nos. CUPB/NT-01(2015) and T/NT-01(2016) for various non-teaching posts. After the advertisement, the University received guidelines from the UGC/MHRD regarding discontinuation of interviews for the junior level posts i.e. non-gazetted posts in Group-B and Group-C.

Further, keeping in view the above guidelines, the University prepared the Selection Criteria which was uploaded on the University website. On the basis of written test, domain test, qualification & experience, the selection committee recommended two candidates for the appointment on the post of Senior Technical Assistant (Computer). However committee also gave its recommendation that work of Senior Technical Assistant involves handling of networking, hardware & software issues and the candidate should be expert in configuring latest devices, further the university is going to shift in the main campus in a year hence the



candidate must be technically and practically sound along-with good communication skills. Further the committee was of view that it is not possible to judge the practical knowledge and communication skills of candidates on the basis of their theoretical objective exams, therefore, selection procedure must involve practical skill test and interview so that practical knowledge and communication skills can be checked. The committee was apprised that to adopt these recommendations, change in CRR is required which may take 6-12 months and university work will suffer. Therefore the committee concluded that the candidates selected through present procedure may be appointed on contractual basis initially for 6 months or for the time till regular appointment is made as per university rules. These recommendations of the committee were put up before the Executive Council in its 22nd meeting. The Executive Council approved these recommendations and candidates were offered appointment for 6 months and their reappointment was subject to their performance.

The Secretary informed that the contractual appointment of STA (Computer) is *sub-judice*.

It was added that the University is going to advertise the vacant non-teaching positions shortly. In the view of recommendations of the committee and approval of the 22nd meeting of the Executive Council, the university incorporated the weightage of the performance test in the selection criteria for the posts of STA (Lab), STA (Computer), Technical Assistant, Driver and Cook, so that the marks secured by the candidates in Performance Test can be counted towards final selection merit.

The Recruitment Cell of the University proposed following selection criteria which were put up before the 25th meeting of the Executive Council.

1. Non-Teaching Posts having Grade Pay of Rs. 4600 and above (except posts having Grade Pay of Rs. 10,000/- and the posts of Librarian, Deputy Librarian and Assistant Librarian);
2. Non-Teaching Posts having Grade Pay below Rs. 4600 {Except posts of STA (Lab), STA (Computer), Driver and Cook};
3. STA (Lab), STA (Computer), Technical Assistant, Driver and Cook
4. Librarian, Deputy Librarian and Assistant Librarian (both Selection and Screening Criteria)

The Secretary, EC informed that Executive Council approved these selection criteria, therefore the university wrote a letter to UGC vide letter No. CUPB/CC/17/UGC/1100 dated 20.07.2017 for information and concurrence for incorporating performance test in the selection criteria of STA, Technical Assistant, Driver and Cook (*Annexure-26.5*). In the letter the university explained the necessity of conducting performance test for these posts as under:

1. Senior Technical Assistant/Technical Assistant (STA/TA)

The E-Governance initiatives required to transform India into a digital empowered society and knowledge economy demand better internet connection. The job profile of STA/Technical Assistant (Computer) will have a pivotal role to implement the "Digital India" programme. So the persons appointed on such posts are required to have strong practical and technical skills. It may not be appropriate to judge the most suitable candidate on the basis of theoretical knowledge alone. Since the work of STA/TA involves handling of networking, hardware & software issues, quickly identifying the problems and their solutions to the disruption or slow internet



connectivity. The candidate should be expert in configuring latest and upgraded devices. Further, the university is going to shift to the main campus in a year or so, hence the candidate must be technically and practically sound to help the university in the establishment of networking in the new campus. In addition to above the person appointed on these posts are required to coordinate live broadcasting of Visitor's address, online admissions, online examinations systems which are integral part of the university systems. We faced very embarrassing situation several times (including during the on-line address of Hon'ble visitor) when the system fails during action. We don't want to experience such problems any more. Similarly STA/TA (Labs) must have practical knowledge to handle sophisticated equipment/chemical etc. The university has a set of sophisticated equipment's and a lot more are to be added in the coming years, which require a person of sound technical knowledge to handle these expensive equipment's. Therefore it will not be appropriate to select candidate on these posts on the basis of written test alone. The weightage of performance test is required.

2. Driver:

Driving is a specialised skill. Not everyone is physically or mentally competent to perform well as a driver. In today's heavy traffic and congested roads, a good driver must be able to drive safely and as per the road rules. Further, he should be able to predict the dynamism of the traffic & save the vehicle and its passengers along with the commuters on the roads. Such type of practical skill can't be evaluated merely through written test or having a valid driving license. A valid license of a driver is a certificate of his skill, but this skill cannot qualify his performance on the road. Therefore, the university believes that a performance test along with written test for the post of Driver can help to choose a suitable candidate.

3. Cook:

Cooking is an art to prepare healthy, clean, hygienic food and presenting it in nice way. In this world almost every one can cook but to cook good hygienic food can't be judged by objective type written test or by possessing a diploma with good grades. The responsibility of a cook is not only to prepare clean and hygienic food and to present the food items in a nice way, they have to cater to the specific concerns of the guests with medical problems, allergies or specific diet plans

In response to the above letter, the directions of the UGC received vide letter No. F.No.8-1/2014(CU) dated 31.07.2017 (*Annexure-26.6*). Relevant contents of this letter are reproduced below:

"The matter has been examined in the UGC office and it is to inform you that the non-teaching positions i.e. Senior Technical Assistant/Technical Assistant, Driver and Cook are related in technical nature and therefore, in recruitment process the skill test is necessary for these posts.

*In view of the positions explained above, the undersigned is directed to inform you that for above stated position performance/skill test is essential in addition to written examination. However, the skill/performance test will be in **qualifying nature** only. It is also to inform that all the technical positions wherever the skill/performance test is essential, university may make the provision in the recruitment rules."*



Further keeping the above in view, selection criteria for the posts of STA (Computer, Lab.), Driver and Cook needs to be amended and it is proposed that the selection criteria for these posts may be kept same as in the case of all other posts having grade pay less than Rs. 4600. A combined selection criteria for all the non-teaching posts below the GP of Rs. 4600/- is placed at (Annexure-26.7)

The Secretary, EC also presented before the Council corrigendum to selection criteria for non-teaching position to be placed on the website (Annexure-26.8)

RESOLVED

The Executive Council, after deliberations, RESOLVED to approve

- a) The amended Selection Criteria for all the posts having grade pay below Rs. 4600 (Annexure-26.7).
- b) The Secretary also presented before the Council Corrigendum to selection criteria to be placed on the website (Annexure-26.8)

Item:No:EC:26:2017:7

To consider the case of grant of non-compounded increments to the faculty.

The Secretary, EC informed that the meeting of the Standing Committee constituted for grant of non-compounded increment to faculty in lieu of their possessing of M.Phil./Ph.D./LLM degree, was held on 27th April 2017. The following members were present during the meeting:-

1. Prof. P. Ramarao, Dean Academic Affairs, Chairperson
2. Prof. S. K. Dawa, COC, Centre for Education
3. Sh. Ajit Singh, Finance Officer
4. Mr. Rajender Kumar, Deputy Registrar (Estb.)- Nominee of Registrar

The committee discussed the cases of **04** faculty members in line with Executive Council's resolve in its 12th meeting vide Item No.EC:12:2014:4 to follow UGC regulations 2010 (F. 3-1/2009 dated 30.06.2010) for grant of non-compounded increments to the faculty.

The Secretary, EC said that the above committee unanimously recommended as under:

1. Dr. Vijay Kumar Yogesh Muley, Assistant Professor:

The committee pursued the minutes of the meeting dated 07.09.2016 and letter issued to him vide no. CUPB/RO/Estb./16/PF/2056 dated 24.10.2016 wherein Dr. Muley was requested to submit Transcript/Mark Sheet specifying the credit hours/grades etc. of his course work from Manipal University. Further, the committee also considered the request dated 07.04.2017, wherein he has requested that he is unable to submit the requisite documents and requested for grant of three (03) non-compounded advanced increments as per rules.

The committee unanimously recommended for grant of Three (03) non-compounded advanced increments to Dr. Vijaykumar Yogesh Muley w.e.f. his date of joining in the



university i.e. 01.02.2016 in lieu of his possessing the Ph.D. degree. As Dr. Muley has left the university on 10.04.2017, the due benefits will be given from 01.02.2016 to 10.04.2017 only.

2. Dr. Sandeep Singh, Assistant Professor:

The committee pursued the request dated 04.04.2017 of Dr. Sandeep Singh for grant of Five (05) non-compounded advanced increment in lieu of his possessing the Ph.D. degree, in line with Judgement of Honourable High Court of Kerala [WP(C)No. 28682 /2012].

The committee also pursued the minutes of the Executive Council vide item No. EC: 12:2014:4 wherein it was resolved to follow the UGC guidelines in this regard and award the non-compounded increments as per rules contained therein.

The committee unanimously recommended that since Dr. Sandeep Singh, Assistant Professor has already been granted benefits of three (03) non-compounded increments in lieu of his possessing the Ph.D. degree, vide office order no. CUPB/RO/Estb./15/112 dated 02.09.2015, and view of the EC resolutions, his request for Five (05) increments cannot be considered.

3. Dr. Vinod Kumar, Assistant Professor:

The committee pursued the request dated 04.04.2017 of Dr. Vinod Kumar for grant of Five (05) non-compounded advanced increment in lieu of his possessing the Ph.D. degree, in line with Judgement of Honourable High Court of Kerala [WP(C) No 28682/2012]. The committee also pursued the minutes of the Executive Council vide item No. EC: 12:2014:4 wherein it was resolved to follow the UGC guidelines in this regard and award the non-compounded increments as per rules contained therein.

The committee unanimously recommended that since Dr. Vinod Kumar, Assistant Professor has already been granted benefits of three (03) non-compounded increments in lieu of his possessing the Ph.D. degree, vide office order no. CUPB/CC/14/Order/3252 dated 25.04.2014, and view of the EC resolutions, his request for Five (05) increments cannot be considered.

4. Dr. Mahesh Kulharia, Assistant Professor:

The committee pursued the request dated 19.04.2017 of Dr. Mahesh Kulharia, Assistant Professor for grant of Five (05) non-compounded increments in lieu of his possessing the Ph.D. degree. The committee was of the view that as per record, Dr. Mahesh Kulharia was extended the benefits of Three (03) Non-Compounded increments in lieu of his possessing the Ph.D. degree at Maharishi Dayanand University Rohtak and he was extended the benefits of pay protection on the basis of his Last Pay Drawn at MDU Rohtak, at CUPB vide Order No. CUPB/CC/OO/1943 dated 18.02.2014.

The committee unanimously recommended that since the benefits of non-compounded increments were granted at MDU Rohtak, he is required to approach to MDU Rohtak

for grant of Five (05) non-compounded increments. He may submit his revised LPC to CUPB and pay may be protected accordingly.

RESOLVED

The Executive Council, after deliberations, unanimously RESOLVED to approve the case of grant of non-compounded increments to the faculty.

Item:No:EC:26:2017:8

To consider the case of Dr. Surinderjit Kaur Bawa for appointment to post of Professor in the Centre for Education.

The Secretary, EC informed that the University invited the application for various teaching position vide Advt. No. T/NT-01(2014) dated 21/10/2014. Dr. Surinderjit Kaur Bawa applied for the post of Professor in Centre for Education.

The recommendation of the duly constituted Selection Committee were as under:-

“Dr. Surinderjit Kaur Bawa is recommended for appointment for 1 year extendable another year at pay as per rules – protection of pay she is currently drawing”

Accordingly, she was given appointment letter for the post of Professor in the Centre for Education for one year extendable by another year on 6th April 2015. Dr. Bawa submitted her joining on 13th April 2015 and her term of one year completed on 12th April 2016. Further, on her request the University extended her services for a period of one more year. Dr. Bawa joined on 13th April 2016 and her term was till 12th April 2017.

Meanwhile, Dr. Surinderjit Kaur Bawa vide their application dated 1st April 2017 again requested that her services as Professor in the Centre for Education may kindly be extended. However, on the recommendations of the Dean Academic Affairs, the competent authority has allowed to continue her services on the existing terms and condition on the following grounds:-

- 1. The eligibility of Dr. Bawa is sub-judice and final decision of Hon'ble Haryana and Punjab High court is awaited.*
- 2. The active teaching sessions/exam/internship planned and new session preparation are in progress.*

RESOLVED

The Executive Council, after deliberations, unanimously RESOLVED to approve the case of extension of present term of Dr. Surinderjit Kaur Bawa as Professor in the Centre for Education, beyond 12th April 2017 for 1 year or till the decision of the Hon'ble Court, whichever is earlier.

The EC FURTHER RESOLVED that Dr. Bawa be appointed on same term and conditions and no increment be allowed for this period.



Item:No:EC:26:2017:9

To consider the appointment of Mr. Sweet Singh as Consultant (Security and Management)

The Secretary, EC informed that Mr. Sweet Singh initially joined in this University on 15th October 2011 as a Campus Manager cum Security Officer on purely temporary and contractual basis for a period of six months.

Mr. Sweet Singh has already attained the age of 65 years on 15th September 2016. However, on his willingness to serve the University, Executive Council in its 22nd meeting vide Item:No:EC:22:2016:41 resolved to approve the appointment of Mr. Sweet Singh as Consultant (Security & Management) on fixed emoluments of Rs. 30,000/- per month for one year.

The Secretary, EC said that his present term, which started on 25th October 2016, will expire on 24th October 2017 as a Consultant (Security and Management) and he has requested for re-appointment vide his application dated 17th August 2017 (*Annexure-26.9*).

The Secretary, EC told that Mr. Sweet Singh is managing all matters related with Security Services, Housekeeping, hospitality, campus maintenance and upkeep. He is very experienced and dedicated person and has been working round the clock in past years. Although, University has outsourced security services and house-keeping to checkmate respectively. There is an urgent need that some official supervise the outsourced work. Mr. Sweet Singh had been managing this work quite effectively. Apart from this he had been looking after transport arrangement and hospitality of statutory bodies.

RESOLVED

The Executive Council, after deliberations, unanimously RESOLVED to approve the re-appointment of Mr. Sweet Singh as a Consultant (Security and Management) for a term of one year w.e.f. 26th October 2017, on the same terms and conditions.

Item:No:EC:26:2017:10

To consider the appointment of Dr. Jaswinder Singh Bilga as Consultant (Horticulture).

The Secretary, EC informed that Dr. Jaswinder Singh Bilga has been working as Consultant (Horticulture) since 5th June 2015 on purely temporary and contractual basis with a fixed emoluments of Rs. 60,000/- per month.

His present term is for a period of 1 year and is going to end on 1st November 2017, as approved by the Executive Council in its 22nd meeting vide Item:EC:22:2016:40:

"The Executive Council after discussing in detail the urgency of need and the expertise of the proposed expert, unanimously RESOLVED to approve the appointment of Dr. J. S. Bilga as Consultant (Horticulture) on fixed emoluments of Rs. 60,000/- per month, for one year"

The Secretary, EC said that the construction at Main Campus is ongoing and planning of landscaping and horticulture is a parallel process and to carry out these activities, there is a need of an expert who can supervise these activities through his vast experience and



expertise. At present Dr. J.S. Bilga has been managing both the Main Campus and City Campus of the University. Further Dr. Bilga has also expressed his willingness to continue for another year with suitable increase in perks (*Annexure-26.10*).

It was also informed that Dr. Jaswinder Singh Bilga has attained the age of 65 years on 19th March 2017.

RESOLVED

The Executive Council, after deliberations, unanimously RESOLVED to approve the re-appointment of Dr. J.S. Bilga as Consultant (Horticulture) for a term year w.e.f. 3rd November 2017, on the same terms and conditions.

Item:No:EC:26:2017:11

To consider the appointment of Er. Prem Sagar as Consultant (Infrastructure).

The Secretary, EC informed that Er. Prem Sagar has been working as Executive Engineer since 3rd November 2016 on purely temporary and contractual basis with a fixed emoluments of Rs. 56,500 (Pay 50,000+ 6000 as conveyance allowance + 500 as mobile allowance). His services was extended for a period of 6 months on 3rd May 2017 and the present term is ending on 2nd November 2017.

Er. Prem Sagar vide his letter dated 18th August 2017 (*Annexure-26.11*) has expressed his willingness to work for another term with suitable increase in salary.

The Secretary, EC informed further that construction at Main Campus is ongoing and Er. Prem Sagar has been looking after all major construction work and planning of Main Campus at Ghudda Village. He has also been corresponding with Agencies/Govt. Offices regarding all matters pertaining to constructions/infrastructure/planning of the University. He has a vast experience in construction and retired as Dy. Chief Engineer (in the scale of 41300-67000+GP 9600) from Punjab State Power Corporation and served the same Organization in various capacity.

RESOLVED

The Executive Council, after deliberations, unanimously RESOLVED to approve the appointment of Er. Prem Sagar as Consultant (Infrastructure) on purely temporary and contractual basis for a period of one year w.e.f. 6th November 2017, on the same terms and conditions.

Item:No:EC:26:2017:12

To review fixation of pay of re-employed faculty after retirement on regular basis.

The Secretary, EC informed that the University in its 3rd Executive Council meeting, vide Item No. EC:3:2010:11 considered the recommendations of the Academic Council vide Item No. AC: 2:2010:7 to provide following incentives to attract competent and senior faculty:



(a) The pension drawn from previous employment be not deducted from the salary.

The Council approved the recommendations of the Academic Council vide Item No. AC:2:2010:7 that in order to attract competent and senior faculty members, and in view of the judgement of the High Court in WP(C) No. 2356/2002 dated 5th December 2008 and LPA 242/2009 and CM Nos 7652-7654/2009 dated 7th July 2009, **the pension drawn from previous employment be not deducted from the salary of the University employees.**

Later FC in its meeting (FC:13:2016:4) considering the recommendations of the committee on Review of pay Fixation resolved to withdraw the item in view of the comments of MHRD and instead deal as per the rules of DoPT and UGC. The EC in its 20th meeting dated 10th March 2016, accepted the resolve of the Finance Committee.

The Secretary, EC said that the University wrote a letter to the Secretary, UGC regarding clarification of pay fixation of Prof. Ashok Dhawan, who was appointed as Professor after retirement from HAU Hisar.

The Under Secretary, UGC vide its letter No. F.No. 78-6/2014(CU)Pt. File dated 7th December 2016 informed the following :-

“With reference to your letter No. CUPB/CC/16/PF/2031 & 2032 dated 20th October 2016 on regarding clarification of pay-fixation of Prof. Ashok Dhawan, the pay drawn by Prof. Ashok Dhawan at the time of retirement would be protected in Central University of Punjab and pension would be reduced from the pay so fixed as per Govt. of India rules. During the period of his re-employment, he is not eligible for any D.R. on Pension but eligible for all admissible allowances on Pay (before reduction of pension).”

RESOLVED

The Executive Council, after deliberations, unanimously RESOLVED to approve the review the earlier resolve of EC regarding fixation of pay in the matter of all employees appointed on regular basis in Central University of Punjab, after retirement.

The Executive Council FURTHER RESOLVED that the fixation will be done as per the rules of DoPT and UGC, in light of the decision of EC in its 20th meeting and letter dated 7th December 2016 of UGC.

Item:No:EC:26:2017:13

To re-consider the incentive for the faculty to promote Extra Mural Research and to attract good faculty.

The Secretary, EC informed that the University in its earlier years, in order to promote extra mural research by the faculty and to meet the severe faculty crunch in the newly established Central University of Punjab by attracting new faculty and retaining the present one, proposed the following incentives to the Finance Committee (*Annexure-26.12*):-

- Dislocation Allowance
- Cumulative Professional Allowance



- Faculty Telephone Allowance Reimbursement
- Internet Facility at University Campus, Hostels and Residence
- Book/ Journal allowance
- Research Seed Money
- Allowances

The Secretary, EC added that these incentives were proposed as the University was facing difficulty to attract faculty. This proposal was although approved in 3rd Finance Committee Meeting vide Item No:FC:3:2011:5, and had been proposed by the Planning Board, it was not discussed in detail either in the Finance Committee or Executive Council, in line with the rules of UGC/MHRD/GFR 2005/ DoPT.

The Chairperson said that the University now has more than 100 faculty members and some of the earlier approved financial benefits like 20% HRA, CPA have been revised in the recent FC/EC meetings. The revision was done to avoid any anomaly from prescribed GoI rules.

RESOLVED

The Executive Council after due discussion, unanimously **RESOLVED** to amend the incentives paid to the faculty as below:

1. **Dislocation allowance be re-named as 'Transfer TA'. It should be uniformly applicable to all eligible teaching and non-teaching employee of the University, irrespective of their date of joining , subject to the following:**
 - a. That the employee is working on regular/deputation/tenure basis (except contractual) and have joined the CUPB from State/Centre funded organisations/autonomous bodies
 - b. That before joining the CUPB, employee was working in regular Pay Scale/Pay Band and had applied through proper channel
 - c. That the employees who availed the allowance TA on transfer will have to serve the university minimum period of three years, otherwise allowance will have to pay back.
 - d. The allowance to be paid and other terms and conditions will be as per GOI rules of Transfer TA
 - e. Employees coming from abroad will be given TA as per above rules but limited to economy fare for self, spouse and two dependent children.
2. CPA already approved in 25th EC meeting.
3. Faculty Telephone Allowance reimbursement will be as follows.
 - Assistant Professor : Up to Rs. 500/-per month
 - Associate Professor : Up to Rs.750/-per month
 - Professor : Up to Rs. 1000/-per month

Maximum reimbursement will be as per Government of India guidelines (Deans to get maximum of Rs. 1800/- not Rs. 2000/-).

Research Seed Money. Research Seed Money to the faculty, once in entire career, will be given as follows.



- Humanities : Up to Rs. 1,50,000/-
- Science : Up to Rs. 3,00,000/-

A duly constituted panel will review the research proposal submitted by the faculty and would also conduct periodical reviews of the research progress.

Allowances: The allowances as approved in 3rd Finance Committee meeting for the faculty who are given additional responsibilities with in accordance to Government of India rules.

The Executive Council FURTHER RESOLVED that a committee comprising of Registrar, Finance Officer and other members be nominated by the Vice Chancellor be constituted to review these allowances/incentives and will give recommendations in regard to their viability and need to continue these incentives in future with suggested amendments(if any). The recommendations of the committee may be taken up for the approval of Finance Committee.

Item:No:EC:26:2017:14

To consider the proposal to declare the teaching staff as vacation staff.

The Secretary, EC informed that the Executive Council in its 25th meeting, held on 17th July 2017, vide Item:No:EC:25:2017:9, resolved, that option be taken from the regular faculty members in a proforma, whether they want to opt for vacation (yes or no). If 50% or more of the regular faculty agree on vacation, then from the academic session 2017-18, the regular teaching staff of the University may be treated as vacation staff and their Earned Leave, encashment etc. be governed by the UGC Guidelines, 2010 and subsequent amendments.

It was further resolved in 25th EC meeting that if on the basis of majority, vacation is adopted,

- (a) the Deans, CoCs, OICs or any other office bearer will be required to perform duties during vacations. They will be given EL as per UGC guidelines, 2010.
- (b) in addition to above the University may ask any of the teaching staff to perform duties during vacations. In lieu of this period, applicable EL as per UGC/DoPT rules will be given.
- (c) the minimum and maximum limit of Earned Leave to be sanctioned at a time will be decided by the Competent Authority on the merit of each case.

Accordingly the Establishment Section requested from the regular faculty member in a proforma, whether they want to opt from vacation (Yes or No). Total 75 regular faculty members out of 91 opted of vacation.

RESOLVED

The Executive Council, after detailed discussion unanimously RESOLVED to approve to declare regular teaching staff as vacation staff w.e.f. on the following terms and conditions:

1. The Earned Leave to teaching staff will be admissible as per clause 8.4.3 of UGC regulations 2010.
2. The Deans, HOD, CoCs, OICs or any other office bearer will be required to perform duties during vacations. In lieu of vacation, they will be given Earned Leave as per UGC guidelines, 2010.



3. in addition to above the University may ask any of the teaching staff to perform duties during vacations. In lieu of this period, they will be given Earned Leave as per UGC guidelines, 2010.
4. The minimum and maximum limit of Earned Leave to be sanctioned at a time will be decided by the Competent Authority on the merit of each case.
5. The Previous Earned Leave (before implementation these rules) credited to the account of faculty will be accumulated.
6. The Earned Leave in the credit of faculty will be encash-able as per GoI rules subject to approval of Finance Committee.

Before Convocation the above mentioned students (S.No. 20-23) became eligible for award of Gold Medal on receipt of satisfactory report from the external examiners and conduct of viva voce.

Further, the Secretary said, the students at S.No. 24-25, namely, Satnam Singh and Katari Akhilesh Kumar, have re-submitted their dissertation to the external examiner for re-evaluation. The Gold Medal rules are silent for eligibility of students in such cases. The Deans' Committee deliberated on the issue in its 10th meeting in detail. It recommended that as Gold Medal is given to extra-ordinary students who have cleared the programme in 1st attempt. In case of re-submission of dissertation, as required by the External examiner, this may not be considered as the 1st attempt. Hence, the Deans' Committee recommended that the Gold Medal may not be awarded to Mr. Satnam Singh, Regn. No. 15mphcp107 and Mr. Katari Akhilesh Kumar, Regn. No.15mphsca07.

The Academic Council in its 16th meeting held on 11th September 2017, considered the Item and also the observation of Prof. Chahal with respect to the proposal at Sr. No. 24 and 25.

The Council noted that the student at S.No. 24 namely, Satnam Singh has re-submitted his dissertation for re-evaluation by the external examiner. It had been rejected twice and now has been sent to external examiner for the third time. The Academic Council ruled out his eligibility for award of Gold Medal in view of his non-completion of requirements to become eligible for degree.

In case of the student at S.No. 25, namely, Katari Akhilesh Kumar, the Academic Council noted that he has completed his requirement for award of Gold Medal before the Convocation. His external examiner has sent his dissertation report and he has also cleared *viva voce* examination successfully. The Council recommended that this student be awarded Gold Medal as on date there is no rule to decide his eligibility and having no rule is itself a rule. Any rule which may be made now, cannot be applicable on this student retrospectively. The members of EC discussed the issue in detail. They suggested that rule in this regard be made now, viz, '*a student getting the Gold Medal should have no repetition/revision in theory examination and his/her dissertation/thesis should have been cleared without revision.*' The members also re-iterated that this rule, however, can be adopted only for future cases and cannot have retrospective implication.

The Academic Council in its 16th meeting vide item No.AC:16:2017:4 has resolved to approve the list of students eligible for award of Gold Medals in 3rd Convocation as placed at *Annexure-26.16*.

RESOLVED

The Executive Council after due deliberations, unanimously RESOLVED to the list of students eligible for award of degree in 3rd Convocation as per Annexure-26.16. (S.No.1-23, and S.No.25), as recommended by Academic Council.



The Executive Council FURTHER RESOLVED that Gold Medal not to be awarded to S.No 24, Satnam Singh as he has not completed requirements to become eligibility for award of degree.

The Secretary, EC informed that at present, the University is issuing Detail Marks Cards (DMC) to students of each semester in paper mode.

The Chairman added that since the University is following the Govt. of India directions for Digital India, the Examination Branch is in process of preparing an in-house software for making Digital Detail Marks Card (DMC), which shall be available to the students online. The Examination Branch will not issue any Detail Marks Card (DMC) in paper mode. The Detail Marks Card (DMC) to be issued to students will be having digital signature. This process will be implemented from the coming semester i.e. from December- 2017.

It was also informed that in addition to above, the Examination Branch is also planning to issue Migration Certificate, Character Certificate, Bonafide Certificate in digital mode.

The Chairman added that rates of Ministry in regard to National Academic Depository (NDA) are not clear. The University is planning to have its own digital lockers.

The Academic Council in its 16th meeting vide item No.AC:16:2017:6 has resolved to approve digitalization of Detail Marks Card (DMC), Migration Certificate, Character Certificate, Bonafide Certificate and other certificates related to the students.

The Secretary, EC informed that the Academic Council in its 15th meeting held on 15th July 2017, considered the issue of nomenclature of degrees of Centre for South and Central Asian Studies.



The Secretary, EC further added that in 15th AC, it was resolved to refer the item back to the Deans' Committee which should consider the case in detail, check the syllabi of these degrees as compared to nomenclature and accordingly change the nomenclature, if required for the existing courses. The Sub-Committee that has been constituted under the Chairmanship of Prof. K.N. Also the Deans' Committee in its 10th meeting discussed the recommendations of this committee. As per Act of the University, the Deans' Committee recommended renaming the Centres as Departments. The final recommendations were presented as placed at *Annexure-26.18*.

RESOLVED

The Executive Council NOTED the joining of faculty members on contractual basis.

Item:No:EC:26:2017:21

To ratify the recommendations of the Committee regarding fee structure for the Advanced Diploma.

The Secretary, EC informed that a committee was constituted by the competent authority to recommend the fee structure for upcoming session of Advanced Diploma and B.Voc. in Agriculture (Green Farming Technology). It met on 22nd August 2017 and discussed following points:

- a) There are approximately 30 students who have successfully completed the Diploma (eligible for admission in Advance Diploma) and Advance Diploma Programme (eligible for admission in B.Voc. Programme). The UGC vide No: F1-86/2015 dated 8th August 2017 has permitted the scheme expenditure up to 30th September 2017, but did not very clearly spell about the B. Voc. course. 24th EC has already given permission to start the Course.
- b) Community College has some of its own funds generated from students' fee/sale of agri products (approx. 1.80 lakh) in the earlier semesters and nearly 30 lakh out of the funding for Community College Scheme is available.
- c) Financial resources are required to successfully run the programme in the partially funded mode which will be requested from University funds if required if the scheme is not extended beyond 30th September 2017.
- d) Further, to reduce the operating expenditure, it is planned in the coming semester that most of the teaching faculty will be empanelled from within the University. External faculty will be empanelled only for subjects/topics where internal subject experts are not available.

The Secretary, EC added, that on the basis of above information, the committee was of the view that UGC scheme of Community College is specifically for the Diploma and Advanced



Diploma course and the finances available under Community College Scheme can be specifically used for same. For B. Voc. Course specific permission is required from UGC. Hence B. Voc. Course for the time being should be kept in abeyance till specific approval of the UGC and only Advanced Diploma should be continued. Further, it was also decided that Registrar and Nodal officer will visit the UGC to take up the matter of B.Voc. for the students who have already passed Advanced Diploma. Other options of self-financing B.Voc. course will also be explored subject to permission from University competent authorities.

The matter of fee was revisited as per suggestions of the competent authorities again on 4th September 2017 and the committee was informed that students were charged Rs. 2500/- per semester for Advanced Diploma programme in the last year. The committee recommend the same fee i.e. Rs. 2500/- semester for the current session (2017-18) of Advanced Diploma.

The above committee recommended that semester fee for Advanced Diploma in Agriculture (Green Farming Technology) be kept same Rs. 2500/- per semester.

The Secretary, EC also informed that UGC has closed this Scheme. The Secretary, however, added that the Chancellor desires that the programmes under the Scheme should continue, as it benefits the local students.

The Academic Council in its 16th meeting vide item No.AC:16:2017:8 discussed this matter and resolved that the Chancellor may be requested to send a letter to UGC/MHRD in this regard. It also resolved that the matter be kept in abeyance till then.

RESOLVED

The Executive Council, after detailed discussions, unanimously RESOLVED that the Chancellor may be requested to send a letter to UGC/MHRD in this regard.

The Executive Council, FURTHER RESOLVED that the matter be kept in abeyance till outcome of the initiative from the UGC.

It was still FURTHER RESOLVED to take immediate necessary steps to start a Department to cater the needs of the community in place of Community College.

Item:No:EC:26:2017:22

To consider allowing B.Voc. Course for existing students only (1year for Advanced Diploma students) under self-financing mode.

The Secretary, EC informed that the UGC under the XII plan emphasized on skill development and vocational courses as Diploma (1year for 10+2 students), Advanced Diploma (1year for Diploma students) and B.Voc. (1year for Advanced Diploma students). The University was given UGC Scheme of Community College in 2015. A batch of students who were admitted in 2015-16 in Diploma in Agriculture (Green Farming Technologies) course were further promoted to Advanced Diploma in 2016-17. Now as per B.Voc. Scheme, the students can be admitted in B.Voc. (1year standalone course for Advance Diploma students).



The Secretary, EC added that the Academic Council vide its 14th meeting, Item no. AC:14:20:2017:29, resolved to approve the B.Voc. in Agriculture (Green Farming Technologies) Course. Further Executive Council vide Item No. EC:24:2017:53, in its 24th meeting also resolved to ratify and allow the continuation of the programme up to B.Voc. as approved by the Academic Council.

Further, the UGC vide D. O. No. F.1-1/2012 (CU) Vol. VI dated 1st August 2015 has laid provision for B.Voc. Programme (for remaining 2 years of XII Plan).

Since the XII plan was only up to 31st March 2017, hence we approached the UGC vide letter No. CC/CUPB/16/552 dated 31/7/2017 to continue the course up to B.Voc. level only for the existing students so that they can complete their degree. In response UGC vide letter No. F.1-86/2015 dated 8th August 2017 informed that the XII plan will continue only up to 30th September 2017.

To safeguard the interest of the students who have already completed Advanced Diploma and are eligible for admission in B.Voc., it is proposed to conduct the B.Voc. course in self-financing mode. The approximate yearly cost for payment of honorarium for guest lectures and office expenditure will be nearly 4.00 lakh. There are 14 students are eligible to take admission in B.Voc. The approximate semester fee will be Rs. 15,000/- . The details of calculations were presented as attached at *Annexure-26.19*.

The Secretary, EC also informed that UGC has closed this Scheme, the Secretary however, added that the Chancellor desires that the programmes under the Scheme should continue, as they benefit the local students.

The Academic Council in its 16th meeting vide item No.AC:16:2017:9 deliberated and resolved that the Chancellor may be requested to send a letter to UGC/MHRD in this regard. It also resolved that the matter be kept in abeyance till then.

The Executive Council, after detailed discussions, unanimously RESOLVED that the Chancellor may be requested to send a letter to UGC/MHRD in this regard.

The Executive Council, FURTHER RESOLVED that the matter be kept in abeyance till outcome of the initiative from the UGC.

To charge *nominal fee* from the candidates as well as *pay honorarium* to the teachers for delivering the lectures to the students preparing for competitive examinations.

To consider draft Memorandum of Understanding (Tri-Partite) to be signed amongst Central University, MHRD and UGC.

The Secretary, EC informed that as per letter dated 11th the July 2017 of MHRD to UGC, it is stipulated in Rule 229(xi) of General Financial Rules, 2017, the autonomous organizations are required to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Administrative Ministry or Department spelling out clearly performance parameters, output targets in terms of details of programme of work and qualitative improvement in output along with, commensurate input requirements. The roadmap for improved performance with clear milestones should form a part of MoU.

The Secretary, EC also presented the draft MoU as placed at *Annexure-26.21*.

The Academic Council considered the same in its 16th meeting vide Item.No.AC:16:2017:11 and resolved to approve in principle the draft Memorandum of Understanding (Tri-Partite) to be signed amongst Central University, MHRD and UGC.

To consider draft discuss and incorporate the comments / suggestions of UGC in various Ordinances.

The Secretary, EC informed that a committee has been constituted to frame draft of Ordinance, Statutes.

In its meeting on 8th September 2017, it was apprised of the letters of the MHRD dated 12.05.2017 and 16.08.2017, whereby the MHRD forwarded the comments of the UGC for incorporation in the draft Ordinances. The letter mentioned to use the word 'Head of the Department' instead 'Coordinator of Centre' in Ordinance related to constitution of selection committees of faculty and Librarian.

This matter was already discussed in the Deans' Committee meeting. The committee was also apprised of the recommendation of the Deans' Committee meeting held on 22.08.2017 that the word 'Centre' in all Centres of Studies may be replaced with the word 'Department'.

After a detailed discussion, the committee recommended that following corrigendum/amendment may be published in the Gazette after approval of the Statutory Bodies and MHRD/UGC:



"The word 'Centre for', wherever used in the nomenclatures of the Centres for(studies), may be replaced with the word 'Department of'. Further, the word 'Centre' or 'Coordinator of Centre', wherever implies as Centre of studies or Head of the Centre, may also be replaced with the word 'Department' and 'Head of the Department'."

The committee unanimously recommended to incorporate the comments/suggestions of the UGC as well as replacement of the word 'Centre for', 'Coordinator of Centre' and 'Centre' with 'Department of', 'Head of the Department' and 'Department' in following Ordinances:

1. Ordinance-XXIII: Selection Committees for Faculty Positions
2. Ordinance-XXIV: Adjunct Professor
3. Ordinance-XXV: Procedures/Norms for Appointment and Emoluments of Non-teaching Employees Except for Statutory Posts
4. Ordinance-XXXI: Selection Committee for Librarian

The final draft of the above Ordinances, incorporating the suggestions/comments and replacement of the words Centre/Coordinator, is placed at *Annexure-26.22*.

The committee also noticed that some of the Ordinances have already been prepared completely as per UGC's Model Ordinance 2012. However, the UGC has commented that these are not in accordance with the Model Ordinance as circulated by the UGC.

Keeping the above in view, the committee unanimously recommended that following Ordinances need to be forwarded to UGC/MHRD again with a note that these Ordinances are framed strictly as per UGC Model Ordinances of 2012. If there is any discrepancy, the same may be specifically mentioned so that the same may be corrected/incorporated:

1. Ordinance-XXXVI: Convocation for Conferring Degrees
2. Ordinance-XXXIX: Transfer of Credit

The final draft of the above Ordinances, incorporating the suggestions/comments and replacement of the words Centre/Coordinator, is placed at *Annexure-26.23*.

The Committee discussed that Ordinance-XXXVII is related to framing guidelines for Collaboration with other Universities/Institutions. Since the comments received from UGC insist on Ph.D. guidelines to be followed, UGC's new Ph.D. Guidelines of 2016 need to be studied further with respect to preparing this Ordinance-XXXVII. Hence, the Committee deferred the Ordinance-XXXVII till it is vetted by the stakeholder.

The Secretary, EC informed that the Committee constituted for framing Ordinances also noted that the University has not framed any Ordinance regulating leaves of Teaching Staff and Ordinance related to Non-Teaching Employees' Terms & Conditions of Service.

The committee in its meeting held on 8th September 2017, discussed the draft Ordinance regulating Leaves of Teaching Staff and unanimously recommended this Ordinance (*Annexure-26.24*) for putting before the Executive Council, subject to approval of the Finance Committee as some of the matters covered under this Ordinance have financial implications.

While discussing the Ordinance related to Non-teaching Employees' Terms & Conditions of Service, the committee was of the opinion that since these are very bulky and need to be studied thoroughly. Subject: **Legal Notice against withholding of appointment letter for the Post of Associate Professor in Center of Education in respect of Dr. Shamshir Singh Dhillon, Asst Professor.**

I, Kabul Singh, Advocate under the instructions and authority of Shamshir Singh Dhillon (hereinafter to be referred as my client) do hereby serve upon you the legal notice to the following effect:-

1. I would like to bring to your kind notice that Central University of Punjab, Bathinda had invited applications from eligible candidates for the Post of Professors, Associate Professor and Asst. Professor vide advertisement No. T/NT/01 (2016) and subsequent corrigendum dated 8th May 2016 with last date to apply extended by 26.09.2016. My client has applied for the one, unreserved Post of Associate Professor in Centre of Education.
2. An interview call was received from the university on dated 15.02.2017 to appear before the Selection Committee on 11th March 2017 at 8 AM at City Campus, Mansa Road, Central University Bathinda. As per interview letter, all the relevant documents of essential qualifications, etc., were scrutinized/checked by the University Authorities and found in order for appearing in the interview. As my client fulfilled the requisite selection criteria under NCTE 2014 regulations and faired very well before the Selection Committee. He was selected/declared successful for the Post of Associate Professor.
3. Subsequently, the name of my client was also approved for appointment, by the Executive Council of CUP in its meeting held on 20th March 2017 vide item no. EC24:2017.6 for the post of Associate Professor. However, Executive Council has put forth an arbitrary clause/rider in the decision that, appointment letter of selected candidates be issued after re-verification of all eligibility criteria in respect of recommended candidates and in case of any discrepancy, the matter be brought back to the Executive Council. Above act of the University has utterly shocked my client as the documents had already been twice checked/scrutinized by University Authorities but again appointed a screening committee to re-verify the documents.
4. It is worthwhile to mention that my client has submitted representation dated 13.06.2017 and 30.06.2017 and visited the University Office several times and requested for personal hearing for issuing of the appointment letter but as on date even after expiry of 4 months from the date of selection neither appointment letter has been issued nor any pitfall/discrepancy in any document indicated. Subsequently,


Deputy Registrar CUP, Bathinda informed my client on dated 27.06.2017 that "the case for issuance of appointment letter is under process and was referred to Screening Committee for verification. The complete form along with re-verification has already been forwarded to Deputy Registrar (meeting) for putting into the next meeting of Executive Council"; without raising any kind of discrepancy in the documents already scrutinized thrice.

5. My client keep on waiting for the Executive Council meeting dated 17.07.2017 and hoping to get the justice from the university. The Executive Council meeting was held on 17.07.2017, agenda was also put up on the above subject but till date, the University has not intimated the proceeding of the meeting and nor issued any appointment letter thereto. It has been given to understand that the University Authorities are not interested to issue the appointment letter to my client and deliberately dilly-dallying the issue for the reasons best known to them.
6. It is pertinent to mention here that my client has again made a representation on dated 01.08.2017 for issuing of appointment letter and awarding personal hearing to seek the justice but neither personal hearing has been granted nor appointment letter issued which is against the natural justice, i.e. audi alteram partem.
7. It will not be out of place to mention here that the University Authorities have issued the appointment letters to other selected candidates in the same advertisement but in this case, deliberate partial, indifferent attitude and delaying tactics are being adopted for non-issuing of appointment letter to my client.
8. It is interesting to note that my client is working in your esteemed university from the last 3-1/2 years on the post of Assistant Professor and all records pertaining to service and his working is with University. All the documents and testimonials of my client have already been verified by the University at his earlier appointment. The subsequent improvement in the qualification and experience has been gained while in service in your university. The re-verification of documents at this stage is an attempt to sabotage the selection process. Moreover, the University is also not indicating the reason of withholding of appointment letter neither allowing personal hearing nor indicating any ambiguity or deficiency in the requisite documents as per NCTE 2014 regulations.
9. Above acts on the part of University are totally illegal, malafide, ultravires, baseless, partial, discriminatory against the settled principles of law and past practice of your esteemed university. Due to illegal and illogical acts of your university, my client is suffering from mental agony and undue harassment at the hands of your university. His bright career has been put on hold by these acts. After selection, about 4 months have elapsed but the university has not issued the appointment letter to my client which clearly shows malafide intention of the University Authorities. Hence, before any legal course of action is initiated against the authorities concerned, as well as you, it is advised to issue appointment letter within 15 days from the date of issue of this notice failing which my client has no option but to claim the losses and all benefits from the date of his selection as Associate Professor.

Under the present compelled circumstances, a legal notice of 15 days, from the date of issue, is hereby served upon you for the issuing of the appointment letter or indicating the reasons for delay for issuing of appointment letter to my client failing which my client will be forced to knock the doors of appropriate courts to claim all kinds of losses at your cost and to seek justice. You will be responsible for the consequences thereto. If at all the authorities have any apprehension of any kind about my testimonials and certificates, an affidavit to this effect can be obtained from my client to avoid the delay in appointment letter. In case my client is not issued the appointment letter for the post of Associate Professor within the stipulated period, it will be presumed that you have nothing to say in your defence against my claim of selection and further my client has no option but to take legal course of action in the competent court of law.



The performance test will help to check specialised skills, capability of handling sophisticated equipment, quick detection and solution to the day to day problems of equipment and networking, communication and analytical skills of a candidate

The justification for adopting performance test for each posts is given below:

1. Senior Technical Assistant/Technical Assistant(STA/TA)

The E-Governance initiatives required to transform India into a digitally empowered society and knowledge economy demand better internet connection. The job profile of STA/ Technical Assistant (computer) will have a pivotal role to implement the "Digital India" programme. So the persons appointed on such posts are required to have strong practical and technical skills. It may not be appropriate to judge the most suitable candidate on the basis of theoretical knowledge alone. Since the work of STA/TA involves handling of networking, hardware & software issues, quickly identifying the problems and their solutions to the disruption or slow internet connectivity. The candidate should be expert in configuring latest and upgraded devices. Further, the university is going to shift to the main campus in a year or so, hence the candidate must be technically and practically sound to help the university in the establishment of networking in the new campus. In addition to above the person appointed on these posts are required to coordinate live broadcasting of Visitor's address, online admissions, online

examination system which are integral part of the university system. We faced very embarrassing situation several times (including during the on-line address of Hon'ble visitor) when the system fails during action. We don't want to experience such problems any more. Similarly STA/TA (Labs) must have practical knowledge to handle sophisticated equipment/chemical etc. The university has a set of sophisticated equipment's and a lot more are to be added in the coming years, which require a person of sound technical knowledge to handle these expensive equipment's. Therefore it will not be appropriate to select candidate on these posts on the basis of written test alone. The weightage of performance test is required.

2. DRIVER:

Driving is a specialised skill. Not everyone is physically or mentally competent to perform well as a driver. In today's heavy traffic and congested roads, a good driver must be able to drive safely and as per the road rules. Further, he should be able to predict the dynamism of the traffic & save the vehicle and its passengers along with the commuters on the road. Such type of practical skill can't be evaluated merely through written test or having a valid license. A valid licence of a driver is a certificate of his skill, but this skill cannot qualify his performance on the road. Therefore, the university believe that a performance test along with written test for the post of Driver can help to choose a suitable candidate.

3. Cook

Cooking is an art to prepare healthy, clean, hygienic food and presenting it in a nice way. In this world almost every one can cook but to cook good hygienic food can't be judged by objective type written test or by possessing a diploma with good grades. The responsibility of a cook is not only to prepare Clean and hygienic food and to present the food items in a nice way, they have to cater to the specific concerns of the guests with medical problems, allergies or specific diet plans.

In view of above the Executive Council has approved to include the performance test along with written test for these posts. You are requested to accord your kind concurrence to include performance/skill test in addition to written examination for these technical posts.



Step-III: After the Skill Test (if applicable), the list of eligible candidates for Written Test will be notified on the university website. The Written Test will comprise of 100 Multiple Choice type Question (MCQ) as per the following details:

In order to promote extra mural research by the faculty and to meet the severe faculty crunch in the newly established Central University of Punjab, Bathinda by attracting new faculty and retaining the present one, the following incentives are approved.

✓ • Dislocation Allowance.







MINUTES OF THE MEETING TO DISCUSS THE PLACEMENT AND NOMENCLATURE OF CENTRES AND SCHOOLS AND ACADEMIC COURSES ANNEXURE-261-

A meeting of the "committee to discuss the placement and nomenclature of Centres and Schools and the academic courses under these Centres" was held under the Chairmanship of Prof. K.N. Pathak on 7th August 2017 at 11:00 am in the Committee Room, Department of Physics, Punjab University, Chandigarh.

Following were present during the meeting:

Prof. S.P. Singh and Prof. Gurmail Singh could not attend the meeting due to their preoccupation. The Chairperson allowed the leave of absence.

Meeting started with the formal welcome of the Chairperson and the committee members by Prof. P. Ramarao, Dean Academic Affairs, CUPB.

ITEM NO. 1: Introduction to existing Schools and Centres of Studies

Prof. Ramarao apprised of the committee that 12 Schools and 68 Centres were approved by the Ministry and the Ordinance was issued as per Act 2009 (**Annexure 1**). However, the UGC has sanctioned to run 20 Departments (Centres) and an additional Centre/School of Education, each with one Professor, two Associate Professors and four Assistant Professors.

Prof. Ramarao informed that prior to 2015, CUPB followed the unconventional courses. However, the response to some of these courses in the university were indifferent. As a result, in 2015 the university reorganised the Schools and Centres as well as degree programmes. He added that since CUPB follows CU Act as well as MHRD/UGC Guidelines and Policies, the reorganised list of Schools/Centres and programmes need to be sent for approval for from the Ministry. Meanwhile, some requests regarding the change in nomenclature of the degree programmes run by the Centres under different Schools may be considered.

The committee discussed the matter in detail and opined that keeping in view the location of CUPB and its nascent stage, it will be better to start with conventional Centres and courses. Once the university gets momentum in terms of students, buildings and infrastructures, the unconventional Centres and courses may be started.

The committee thoroughly discussed the courses and the present position of the university in terms of the admission and **resolved to recommend that:**

1. 80% of the academic programmes of the university should be conventional; and

2. 20% of the academic programmes of the university may be non-conventional.

ITEM NO. 2: To consider the changes in the nomenclature of the degree programmes offered by Centre for South and Central Asia Studies under the School of Global Relations

The committee discussed the nomenclature of Centres under the School of Global Relations and reorganisation of degree programmes being run under the Centre. After deliberations, **the committee resolved to recommend that:**

1. Nomenclature of the School of Global Relations may be changed to 'School of International Studies'. However, this School may be put to suspended animation.
2. Words in braces "(including Historical Studies)" may be deleted from the name of Centre for South and Central Asian Studies. Resultantly, the nomenclature will be Centre for South and Central Asian Studies.
3. Accordingly, the PG/Research courses may be started and the PG/Research in History will move to the concerned 'Centre for Historical Studies' proposed under the School of Social Sciences and Humanities.
4. Further, the PG/Research courses in Political Science may be started in concerned 'Centre for Political Science' proposed under the School of Social Sciences and Humanities.
5. However, the courses being run under the Centre for South and Central Asian Studies will keep on running under this Centre until the University gets approval of the teaching positions for other Centres i.e. Centre for Historical Studies and Centre for Political Studies.

ITEM NO. 3: To consider the status of Centre for Comparative Literature, School of Languages, Literature & Culture.

The committee was apprised of the problem of faculty requirement for different courses viz. MA English; MA Hindi; MA Punjabi; and PhD after merger of three Centres to make it a Centre for Languages and Comparative Literature.

During discussion, the committee opined that separate Centres should be established for separate languages. The committee discussed the issue and **resolved to recommend that:**

1. Nomenclature of School of Languages, Literature and Culture may be changed to 'School of Languages and Literature'
2. There should be four separate Centres as given below:
 - a. Centre for Hindi Language and Literature.
 - b. Centre for Punjabi Language and Literature
 - c. Centre for Languages and Comparative Literature
 - d. Centre for Foreign Languages
3. Some foreign language courses i.e. Certificate Courses, Diploma Courses and Advanced Diploma Courses in French, German and Chinese languages may be started.
4. Admission to above courses will be subject to availability of required number of students in a particular course. In case of non-availability of required number of students, the fee after deductions may be refunded.

ITEM NO. 4: To consider the status of Centre for Law

The committee thoroughly discussed the issue of specialisation and nomenclatures of the Centre and **resolved to recommend that:**

1. Nomenclature of the School of Legal Studies and Governance may be changed to 'School of Legal Studies'
2. Nomenclature of the Centre for Law may be changed to Centre for Legal Studies and Research.
3. Following specialisations in two years' LL.M. programme may be started, wherein first year will be common to all students, and the second year will be particular to students as per his/her option from the following:
 - a. Corporate Laws or Business Laws
 - b. International Laws and Human Rights
 - c. Environmental Laws**
 - d. Constitutional Laws
 - e. Criminal Laws and Criminology

ITEM NO. 5: To look into various Centres and administrative & academic difficulties

The committee was apprised of the various administrative and academic difficulties due to requirement of faculty as per UGC norms. After a detailed discussion, the committee felt the need to make changes in the nomenclatures of Centres and Schools.

The committee, after deliberations, resolved to recommend that:

1. Nomenclature of the School of Environment and Earth Sciences may be changed to 'School of Environment Sciences'.
2. Centre for Waste Management may be shifted from School of Basic & Applied Sciences to School of Environmental Sciences.
3. School of Basic and Applied Sciences may be split into following Schools and the Centres under this School may be distributed as given under the respective Schools:
 - a. School of Basic Sciences
 - i. Centre for Animal Sciences
 - ii. Centre for Plant Sciences
 - iii. Centre for Chemical Sciences

Prof. R. K. Kohli welcomed all the members and asked Prof. S. S. Marwaha to present the agenda. Prof. Marwaha informed that Prof. Gurmail Singh, Vice Chancellor, Akal University and Mr. Nitin Singal, Indotech Engineering Products had telephonically expressed their inability to attend the meeting because of other exigencies and requested for leave of absence which was granted. Thereafter, Dr. Marwaha presented the item wise agenda.

After discussion and deliberations, the following decisions taken were taken:

Agenda 7/2017/1: Confirmation of minutes of the last meeting

Minutes of the sixth meeting of IQAC were placed for approval and confirmation of IQAC.

- *Minutes of the 6th meeting were confirmed.*

Agenda 7/2017/2: Action taken on decision of the Previous Meeting of IQAC

Members, while taking note of the action taken on various items recommended the following additions/supplementations. The agenda wise changes/additions/supplementations and the resolutions thereafter on the agenda items of the 6th meeting are as follows:

- **Agenda 6/2017/4-Curriculum Aspects – Academic Calendar for the year 2016-17:** it was resolved that to meet the requirement of summer internship programmes and trainings

Semester break (between odd and even semester) shall not be of more than one week.

- **Agenda 6/2017/5-Teaching-Learning and Evaluation-Improvement of GPA:** it was resolved that there should be limit of number of chances to improve GPA.
Students who wish to improve GPA shall have to pay the registration fee and be given two more chances in addition to the original chances.

- **Agenda 6/2017/8-Students Support and Progression-Language problem of the students:** it was resolved that
A course on technical and scientific writing be introduced as non-credit compulsory course of 2 credit hours in the Ph.D. programmes being run by the University and the contents of the course be developed taking guidance from other universities offering such course to their students.

- **Agenda 6/2017/8-Students Support and Progression-Competitive Examination Cell:** the report of Dr. Kiran and Dr. Pathak, Coordinators of Competitive Examination Cell, for charging the nominal fee from the students joining classes offered by this cell for the preparation of NET and other competitive examinations as well as paying honorarium to the in-house and out-source faculty for delivering lectures was put up to the members which after deliberation resolved that
 1. *Principally approved to charge nominal fee from the candidates as well as pay honorarium to the teachers for delivering the lectures to the students preparing for competitive examinations.*
 2. *Competitive Examination Cell shall focus on preparing the students for Paper-I and the concerned centres shall prepare the students Paper-II and III by giving Mock tests of previous years question papers.*

- **Agenda 6/2017/9-Innovation and Best Practices:** The members were apprised of the status of the undertakings provided by the various centres that they are taking care of the course contents of various papers that they are aligned to NET syllabus. It was resolved that
Soft reminder shall be sent to the CoCs who have yet not provided the undertakings to the IQAC office w.r.t. the alignment of the course contents with NET syllabus of the programmes being run under their centres.

Agenda 7/2017/3: Progress report of IQAC

Internal Quality Assurance Cell has initiated the collection of information from different centres for compiling and finalising the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) for the academic session 2017-18.

The progress report of IQAC was noted by the members.

Agenda 7/2017/4: Placement Cell

Members of IQAC were informed that the matter regarding the Student Placement Cell was discussed in the second meeting of University Industry Forum held on March 21, 2017, under the chairmanship of Hon'ble Vice Chancellor. The members were further informed, that Prof. P. Ramarao, DAA and Chairman, Placement Cell brought out that the University has a Placement Coordination Cell and to assist

the cell, committees have been constituted at the level of Centres. The IQAC members were further informed that University Industry Forum to activate the placement cell at CUPB recommended that:

1. The Cell should be under the charge of students and should be managed by them with the support of some faculty mentor.
2. The students team handling the management of the placement cell should have the minimum facilities such as furnished space for holding group discussions, interviews, reception of guests one office room etc. and Budget.
3. An open Industry day should be celebrated and the representatives from industries that are members of the Forum and also others should be invited. This will also help in creating the Industry-University belongingness.
4. Electronic copy of Placement Brochure should be sent to several industries including the members of University Industry Forum across the country.
5. List of students seeking job may be displayed on the University Web Site.

The members of the IQAC committee are informed that the construction of University's own campus is going on and it is likely to move to the same by next academic session i.e. 2018-19. The recommendations of University Industry Forum listed above (Sr. No. 1 to 5) are appreciable but at present it is difficult for CUPB to implement the same because of the constraints of faculty and space.

CUPB proposed to implement the above suggestions (Sr. No. 1 to 5) as such after shifting to its new campus being built up at village Ghudda.

After deliberation, it was resolved that:

1. *Centred Placement Coordination Cell under the chairmanship of Prof. P. Ramarao, Dean Academic Affairs. The Cell shall include Prof. S. S. Marwaha, Coordinator, IQAC in place of Prof. A. K. Dhawan, Dean, School of Emerging Life Sciences who has superannuated in the month of March 2017, whereas the remaining other two members shall continue as members of the Placement Coordination Cell.*
2. *As placement include arranging for the students as well as summer/professional trainings etc., the concerned authority may see that if the University can include some fee to be charged from the students to promote the placement activities, to meet the expenses on the preparation of brochures, for circulation amongst the various job providers, hiring the services of some professional group/individuals involved in placements of the students.*

Agenda 7/2017/5: Curriculum Aspects

Updation/restructuring of Curriculum

For updating/restructuring the course structure and course contents of various centres, it is proposed that the guidelines of the regulatory bodies are to be followed. Further, feedback of passouts, the suggestion(s)/recommendation(s) of University Industry Forum and Council and feedback of Placement Cell be taken into account.

After deliberation, it was resolved that

Letters be sent to all CoCs/OICs for taking the status of Updation/restructuring of the Curriculum. If not done, they should do the same by taking into the guidelines of the regulatory bodies and feedback from the concerned relevant persons/students.

Designing of interdisciplinary programmes

Centres may be asked to focus more efforts on designing interdisciplinary programmes, designing of academic and research & development facilities based on result oriented teaching or addressing national and global issues.

After deliberation, it was resolved that

Centres being run in the University, are following the UGC guidelines and offering various interdisciplinary courses/programmes.

Flexibility of taking advanced courses by students.

Creating flexibility in taking advance course by students. Modalities to be discussed w.r.t. timetable, examination and evaluation.

Members were informed that

Students are given the flexibility to choose the advance courses as per their choice/requirements of the programmes/specialization they are persuing.

Overseas programmes

Plan to start overseas programmes to be offered on campus.

Members were informed that

UGC is not allowing to run overseas programmes on the campus.

Foreign Students

Centres may develop self-sustainable Ph.D. programmes to attract foreign students.

Members were informed that

CUPB in the 25th meeting of Executive Council (EC) has approved the guidelines for persuing Ph.D. programmes by the foreign students.

Time Course for Ph.D. degree completion

Ph.D. degree by CUPB shall be of three (3) years duration extendable up to maximum of five (5) years. Periodic assessments of the Ph.D. scholars shall be carried out to ensure that they would complete their degree with in the allocated time.

Members after deliberation recommended that

Timeline for the completion of Ph.D. Degree shall be of three years extendable to maximum of five years. Also, it was resolved that the periodic assessment of Ph.D. scholars shall be carried out to ensure that they complete their degree within the allocated time.

Agenda 7/2017/6: To initiate the process of UGC SAP

As per the requirement of UGC under Special Assistance Programme (SAP), the centre should have at least six faculty members including one Professor. Thus, the centres which fulfil the above criteria may be advised/directed to initiate the process to apply for SAP.

After deliberation, it was resolved that

All centres who fulfill the conditions of UGC for the award of Special Assistance Programmes (SAP) shall be advised to initiate the process to apply for SAP.

Agenda 7/2017/7: Research, Consultancy and Extension

Strengthening of Interdisciplinary research through inter-department as well as inter-institutions collaboration. The areas of collaboration be identified by holding seminars/workshops.

Agenda was approved and recommended.

Agenda 7/2017/8: Infrastructure and Learning resources

To promote sports and cultural activities

University is in the process of formulating a schedule of indoor and outdoor sports as well as cultural activities. The process has also been initiated with UGC to sanction the staff for creating Directorate of Sports/ Cultural Activities to promote both the activities to enable the University to compete with other established institutions in the country.

The members were informed that

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING between Central University of Punjab, Bathinda, MHRD and University Grants Commission, New Delhi for 2017-2018.

This is a tri-Partite memorandum of understanding (MoU) being signed among MHRD and UGC, New Delhi

and

the third party, **Central University of Punjab** (hereafter referred to as Central University)

With the objective to measure the performance of the Central University on selected Key parameters against the targets set so as to improve the performance on the critical parameters of the organization.

This MoU has been structured into four parts:

Part 1. VISION, MISSION AND OBJECTIVES

1.1 Vision

- Uplift and upgrade the standards of teaching, learning and research to global levels of excellence;
- Create benchmarks in research, patents and consultancy services;
- Strategize to become a global epicenter of knowledge, culture, skills and technologies;
- Develop a scientific temper and a performance culture of pro-active decision-making;
- Act as a catalyst of change by setting high infrastructural growth rate, in academic and co-academic excellence, in learning and evaluation, in social interfacing with the stakeholders, in human resource development, in safety and security systems, in process management, and in seamless integration with the surrounding communities;
- Cross-pollinate with new ideas, new technologies, new platforms and new world-views;
- Continue expanding and exploring, locally, nationally and globally

1.2 Mission

- Offer a wide range of instructional and research facilities across integrated and cross-disciplinary studies;
- Promote innovation in teaching, learning, evaluation, research and consultancy services;
- Create an ignited workforce responsive to regional, national and global needs in tune with the requirements of academics, industry, business and administration ;
- Participate in the problems and concerns of the surrounding community and the civil society

1.3 Objectives

- 1.3.1 To provide good learning experience to the students with due emphasis on interactive teaching learning and placements.
- 1.3.2 To adhere through global best practices and bench marks in respect of student faculty ratio, PG to UG student ratio, Doctoral to PG students ratio, Quality publications, Academic and sponsored Research output and Industry driven initiatives.
- 1.3.3 To increase the student capacity to meet the growing demands for competent manpower from National and International markets.

- 1.3.4 To increase revenue by starting innovative academic and training programmes for the faculty and professionals.
- 1.3.5 To improve the quality of life of people in general and socio-economic environment in and around the Central University in particular as outreach activity.
- 1.3.6 To contribute in the National economy by producing competent human resources.

Part 2. EXERCISE OF ENHANCED AUTONOMY AND DELEGATION OF FINANCIAL POWERS

- 2.1 All such power are available to the Executive Council (EC) of the Central Universities as are provided for by the Acts and Statues as well as ordinances framed thereunder. Executive Council shall not use its power to lay down any policy that has an overriding or overruling impact on university's Act.
- 2.2 The Central University shall ensure that the user charges / fees charged by it for its various courses recover the maximum cost of providing services.
- 2.3 The Central University shall follow the General Financial Rules, 2017 issued by Department of Expenditure, Ministry of Finance, Government of India in all its financial transactions including procurement of goods and services.
- 2.4 The Central University shall adopt the Public Financial Management System (PFMS) for receipt of all funds from UGC / Government of India and make all payments through the PFMS to the last mile as far as possible.
- 2.5 The Central University shall send to the MHRD and UGC any information required by it to satisfy any requirement related to Parliamentary Matter, RTI, Court Cases, Public Grievances or inputs to policy decision to be taken by the UGC/MHRD within the time specified by the UGC/MHRD.
- 2.6 In addition to the above, any other delegation of power needed will be taken up separately by the Central University with MHRD and UGC.

Part 3. PERFORMANCE EVALUATION PARAMETERS AND TARGETS 2017-18

- 3.1 In fulfilment of its obligations under the MoU, the Central University shall undertake to achieve certain level of performance for the year 2017-18. The performance will be evaluated using the criteria listed at Annexure-I and Annexure-II. The weights to be attached to each criterion and the criterion values corresponding to different performance rating are also given therein. The overall score will be calculated through the formula given in the Annexure-II based on the scores obtained in each parameter.
- 3.2 There shall be also a negative marking by which the overall score obtained through Annexure-I will be reduced based on penalties listed out in Annexure-II.
- 3.3 The consolidated score shall be arrived at by reducing the negative score obtained in Annexure-II from the overall score obtained under Annexure-I.
- 3.4 The overall rating shall be as given in the Annexure-III based on the consolidated score obtained in para 3.3 above.

Part 4. FACILITATION / ASSISTANCE FROM THE GOVERNMENT/UGC

1. The Institution has made the commitment of Performance Evaluation Targets based on certain assumptions in respect of release of grants from Government/ UGC and raising of other resources, including loan from HEFA for expansion of infrastructural facilities, which has a direct bearing on the performance of the Institution committed in this MOU. The commitment of UGC/ MHRD and other possible sources of revenue generation are listed in Annexure IV.
2. UGC/MHRD will extend any other facilitation like taking up the matters with the State Government concerned or any Ministry of the Union Government, as and when required.

Part 5. ACTION PLAN FOR IMPLEMENTATION AND MONITORING OF THE MoU

- 5.1 Performance evaluation against these MoU parameters shall be carried out every quarter and monitored by the Central University.
- 5.2 The performance evaluation shall be submitted to the Executive Council (EC) during the EC meetings for information. After the EC meeting, the same shall be sent to UGC along with its recommendations.
- 5.3 A joint review by the Central University and UGC and MHRD shall be carried out within 90 days of completion of the financial year. The result of the joint review shall be placed before the Executive Council and hosted prominently on the website of the Central University.

ORDINANCE-XXIV

ADJUNCT PROFESSOR [Act Section 6 (1) (xvi), 28 (1) (0)]

1. Selection Committee for the post of Adjunct Professor will comprise of the following:

1.1	Vice Chancellor or his nominee	Chairman
1.2	One of the Deans to be nominated by the Vice Chancellor	Member
1.3	Head of Concerned Department	Member
1.4	One External Expert, to be nominated by the VC	Member
1.5	Registrar	Convener

2. **Qualification, Experience and Selection Criteria:**

Candidate should be a distinguished persons from within the country or abroad, who has special competence in one of the fields of study covered by the University. If the committee recommends the case, the same would be forwarded to the competent authority for consideration and necessary approval from Executive Council.

2.1 Qualifications:

Candidate for adjunct faculty should satisfy the following norms:-

a) *For Conventional Higher Education Courses:*

- i) Should have the minimum qualifications as prescribed in the regulations framed by UGC/respective statutory councils from time to time. **OR**
- ii) A person of eminence with or without a postgraduate or Ph.D. qualifications.

b) *For Skill based Courses:*

- i) Should be an accomplished professional/expert in his chosen field of discipline and may not necessarily possess qualifications prescribed under UGC regulations. **OR**
- ii) Should be a certified professional, for teaching and training on National Occupational Standards under NSQF, by the sector Skills Council for teaching respective trade/job role.

They are also expected to have an understanding of industry requirements, National Occupational Standards (NOSs) and Assessment & Certification for skills.

In addition to the above, it is expected that the adjunct faculty in both the above steams would be an accomplished scholar in his area of specialization and his association would add value to the academic programmes he is associated with.

2.2 Selection Criteria:

Adjunct Faculty will be appointed by the competent authority based on the recommendation of a Committee, Period of empanelment will vary from 06 month to 03 years as decided by the Institutions on mutually agreed terms and conditions. It is expected that any application for adjunct faculty is first discussed at the department level. The department may forward the application with comments specifying the suitability of such candidates(s) in the

department/institution level academic activities. If the department recommends a case for adjunct faculty, the same should be examined by a committee.

3. Period of Empanelment:

Period of empanelment will vary from 06 months to 03 years as decided by the University on mutually agreed terms and conditions.

4. Number of Posts:

The strength of Adjunct faculty may not exceed 25% the sanctioned strength of faculty at any time.

5. Roles and Responsibilities:

5.1 Teaching

5.1.1 Conventional Higher Education Courses: Adjunct faculty will be expected to teach courses directly related to his specific expertise and professional experience or the areas of his specialization. He may also contribute to the institution's activities like counseling of students, developing new courses (s) and pedagogical improvements.

5.1.2 Skill based Vocational Courses: The core courses pertaining to specialized skills/approved trainers or other persons with appropriate skill proficiency. Such faculty imparting education and training to learners in skill based course, should have relevant NSQF qualifications, preferably certified by the relevant Sector Skill Council.

5.1.3 Research Courses: Adjunct Professor may also be involved in the M.Phil / Ph.D. coursework based on his professional and research proficiency adjudged by the concerned institution.

5.2 Training: Adjunct Professor will be expected to facilitate the setting of workshops and labs, providing hands on training in the relevant domain areas, development of soft skills, and focus on ensuring competency based learning outcomes among students.

5.3 Research: Adjunct Professor is expected to interact with and supervise the research student in the area of his specialization of professional proficiency. However, there should be preferably one core faculty members associated as supervise/Co-supervise for smooth induction and coordination of academic procedures. The adjunct faculty may lack a traditional academic background in such case, they are not expected to contribute to the institutions research and creative mission by participating in traditional scholarly activities (i.e. they are not expected to conduct independent research and/or publish in peer-reviewed journals). Instead, he may participate by advising faculty on their research project, serving as a liaison between the institutions and industry or government entities to identify research and/or funding opportunities or by working with faculty to identify research and/or funding opportunities or by working with faculty to identify research project that would benefit private industry and/or government entities.

5.4 Services: Adjunct faculty is also expected to actively participate in service related activities, such as sitting on departmental committee, serving as advisors to faculty and/or undergraduate and post graduate students, helping students network, and active collaboration with the industry / employer providing internship and job opportunities.

5.5 Subject to the above, the Vice Chancellor will determine, at his/her discretion, such other terms and conditions as may be deemed necessary.

6. Costs and Honorarium:

6.1 Adjunct faculty will be provided travel cost, as per entitlement, from his/her institution/place of stay and back, maximum six (06) times per academic year. No reimbursement for hiring accommodation will be permissible. However, she/he will be provided free lodging and boarding in the Guest House.

6.2 She/he will be provided an honorarium of Rs. 1000/- (Rs. One Thousand Only) per lecture to a maximum of Rs. 4000/- (Rs. Four Thousand Only) per day of service subject to a maximum ceiling of Rs. 80,000/- (Rs. Eighty Thousand Only) per month. The Adjunct Faculty will work at the host institution for a minimum of 02 days per visit.

7. Monitoring

At the end of assignment, every Adjunct Faculty will submit a 'performance report' to the host university with a copy to the University Grants Commission. The performance report, may be considered for his continuation / renewal of next tenure.

8. The guidelines issued by University Grants Commission from time to time with respect to Adjunct Professors will be followed.

ORDINANCE-XXV

PROCEDURE/NORMS FOR APPOINTMENT AND EMOLUMENTS OF NON-TEACHING
EMPLOYEES EXCEPT FOR STATUTORY POSTS
[Act Section 28(1) (o); Statute 23(2)]

1. **Scale of Pay**
The Non-teaching employees of the University shall be paid a monthly salary and allowances admissible as per their respective Pay Bands prescribed by the UGC/GOI and adopted by the University from time to time.
2. **Term of Appointment and Qualifications**
The employees of the University shall be appointed in accordance with the Recruitment Rules notified by the University from time to time with the approval of the competent authority which will be in consonance with the Govt. of India/UGC guidelines issued from time to time.
3. **Constitution of Selection Committees**
 - 3.1 The constitution of Selection Committees for appointment at non-teaching positions shall be as prescribed in the Cadre Recruitment Rules notified by the University from time to time.
 - 3.2 The Vice Chancellor may co-opt one or more members as may be required.
4. **Probation**
The non-teaching employees shall be placed under probation for a period as prescribed in the Cadre Recruitment Rules. On successful completion of their probation, they shall be confirmed as per criteria laid down by the University for this purpose
5. **Entitlement of Leave**
Employee shall be entitled to all kinds of leave as per rule of Govt. Of India.
6. **Medical Insurance/LTC/Other Benefits**
Employees shall be entitled to Medical Insurance/LTC/Other Benefits as per rules prescribed by Government of India.
7. **Conduct Rules**
All employees shall be governed as per rules prescribed by Government of India.
8. **Service Contract**
All employees shall be required to sign a Service Contract with the University.
9. **Removal**
A non-teaching employee of the University can be removed from office as per the provisions of the Act, Statutes or relevant Ordinances.

ORDINANCE-XXXI

SELECTION COMMITTEE FOR LIBRARIAN

[Act Section 28, Statute 18(2) & (4)]

1. There shall be Selection Committee for making recommendation to the Executive Council for the appointment of Librarian.
2. The Selection Committee shall comprise of the following:
 - 2.1 Vice Chancellor Chairperson (Ex-officio)
 - 2.2 *An academician nominated by the Visitor* Member
 - 2.3 Dean of the School concerned Member (Ex-officio)
 - 2.4 *Head/Chairperson of the Department/School* Member (Ex-officio)
 - 2.5 Three experts in the concerned subject/field nominated by the Vice Chancellor out of the panel of names approved by the relevant statutory body of the university. Members
 - 2.6 An academician representing SC/ST/OBC/ Minority/Women/Differently-abled categories, if any of candidates representing these categories is the applicant, to be nominated by the Vice Chancellor, if any of the above members of the selection committee do not belong to that category. Member
3. At least four members, including two outside subject experts, shall constitute the quorum.
4. The decision shall be arrived at by the Selection Committee by a majority vote. In case there is a tie, the Chairperson shall exercise a casting vote.
5. The guidelines issued by University Grants Commission from time to time with respect to Selection Committee will be followed.

ORDINANCE-XXXVI
CONVOCATION FOR CONFERRING DEGREES
[Section 28 (O) & Statute 29 of the Act]

1. Annual Convocation

A Convocation for the purpose of conferring degrees shall ordinarily be held once in year on such date and place as may be fixed by the Vice Chancellor with prior approval of the Chancellor.

Provided that in case the Convocation is not held in a particular year, the Vice Chancellor shall be competent to authorize admission of successful candidates in the year to their respective degrees in absentia and issue the degrees on payment of prescribed fees.

2. Special Convocation

- 2.1 A special convocation may be held at such time as may be decided by the Executive Council for the purpose of conferring Honorary degrees in accordance with the procedure laid down in Statute 29 for the purpose of conferring other degrees under special circumstances on the recommendation of the Academic Council.
- 2.2 The convocation shall consist of the body corporate of the University.
- 2.3 The Chancellor shall, preside over the Convocations of the University for conferring degrees.

3. Report

At the Annual Convocation the Vice Chancellor shall present a report of the year's work in the University.

4. Notice

- 4.1 Not less than four weeks' notice shall be given by the Registrar for meetings of the relevant statutory authorities for the Convocation.
- 4.2 The Registrar shall, with the notice, issue to each member of the convocation, a programme of the procedure to be observed there at.
- 4.3 The candidates who have passed their exams in the year since the last convocation shall be eligible to be admitted to the convocation.

5. Application

- 5.1 A candidate for the degree must submit to the Registrar his application on or before the date prescribe for the purpose for admission to the degree at the Convocation in person along with prescribed fees.
- 5.2 Such candidates as are unable to present themselves in person at the convocation shall be admitted to the degree in absentia by the Chancellor or in his/her absence by the Vice-Chancellor and their diplomas shall be given by the Registrar on application and payment of prescribed fees.

6. Fees

The fees for admission to the degree at the Convocation in person or in absentia shall be as decided by Academic council.

7. Honorary Degree

- 7.1 Honorary degree shall be conferred only at convocation and may be taken in person or in absentia.
- 7.2 The presentation of the persons at the Convocation on whom honorary degrees are to be conferred shall be made by the Vice-Chancellor or in his absence the Senior-most Dean of the University.
- 7.3 Candidates at the convocation shall wear gowns and hoods appropriate to their respective degrees as specified in rules by the University. No candidate shall be admitted to the convocation who is not in proper academic dress prescribed by the University.

8. Academic Dress

The academic dress of the University for the Convocation shall be as prescribed by the University.

9. Convocation Procedure

The Convocation Procedure of the University shall be as framed under its rules by the University.

ORDINANCE-XXXIX

TRANSFER OF CREDIT

[Act Section 6(2) (iv)]

1. This Ordinance will provide a framework for promoting and facilitating the Interuniversity transfer and mobility of students across different Universities of India and abroad that can work well.
2. **This Ordinance is aimed at prescribing:**
 - 2.1 procedure for facilitating and promoting transfer of credits earned by the students of this University to other Universities / Educational Institutions; and
 - 2.2 policy framework, procedure and conditions for accepting transfer of credits earned by a student from other Universities / Educational Institutions.
3. **Facilitation for Transfer of Credits to other Universities / Educational institutions:**
 - 3.1 The University shall facilitate transfer of credits earned by its students to other Universities / educational institutions.
 - 3.2 A student of the University seeking transfer of credit to other Universities/ institutions shall submit a written request, along with the fee as prescribed by the Academic Council from time to time, to the Controller of Examinations.
 - 3.3 The Controller of Examinations, upon receipt of such request, shall issue a complete transcript of the Courses taken by the student in the University and shall forward the application of the students to the University/ institution concerned.
4. **Policy and Procedure for accepting Credit Transfer from other Universities:**

The University shall have a policy of accepting transfer of credits earned by a student from the following Universities / educational institutions / research institutions:

 - 4.1 Universities recognised under Section 12(b) of the UGC Act.
 - 4.2 Universities that are members of the Association of Indian Universities.
 - 4.3 Such foreign Universities, the Courses / Programmes of which are recognised as equivalent to those of Indian Universities by the Association of Indian Universities.
 - 4.4 Indian Institutes of Technology (IIT)
 - 4.5 Indian Institutes of Management (IIM)
 - 4.6 National Institutes of Technology (NIT)
 - 4.7 Indian Institutes of Science Education and Research (IISER)
 - 4.8 Indian Institutes of Information Technology (IIIT)
 - 4.9 Schools of Planning and Architecture (SPA)
 - 4.10 All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS)
 - 4.11 Such Indian or Foreign University / educational institution / research institution with which the University has signed an MOU for students and faculty exchange.
 - 4.12 Any other University / educational institution / research institution that has been recognised and approved for the purpose of credit transfer by the Academic Council of the University.
5. **Request for acceptance of transfer of credits shall be:**

- 5.1 entertained only if received from such candidates who have been duly selected for admission in a Programme of Studies, as per the rules governing admission in the University;
 - 5.2 made by the student concerned within 10 days from the date of his/her admission in the University.
 - 5.3 made in the prescribed format and along with the fees as prescribed by the Academic Council of the University from time to time.
 - 5.4 supported by such documents as may be prescribed by the Academic Council.
6. Dean of the School concerned shall be the Nodal Officer for receiving and processing the request for accepting the transfer of credits. To facilitate and expedite the process, the Dean may constitute a Committee comprising a senior faculty as chairperson and two faculty members to process and finalise the request for acceptance of credit.
 7. The maximum credits that can be accepted for transfer shall not exceed 20% of the total credits required for the completion of the Programme of Studies in which a student has been admitted.
 8. Only such Courses may be considered for acceptance of credit transfer, in which the student has secured at least B grade / GPA of 2 or above / a minimum of 50% marks, as the case may be. In case a student has earned more credits from other Universities / educational institutions/ research institutions, the student may indicate his/her preference for credit transfer. However, the decision of the Dean of the School concerned in this regard shall be considered as final.
9. **The credit equivalence for accepting credit transfer shall be determined as under:**
 - 9.1 for credit(s) earned by students from Universities that have the credit system in place, a Course work requiring 10 hours of contact hours shall be considered as equivalent to 1 credit of the University;
 - 9.2 for Courses completed from Universities / educational institutions / research institutions that do not follow credit system but have semester system in place, a course work requiring a minimum 30 lecture hours per semester shall be considered as equivalent to 3 credits of the University; and
 - 9.3 for Courses completed from Universities / educational institutions / research institutions that neither follow the credit system nor have the semester system, a Course work requiring formal classroom instruction/lab work of at least 3 hours per week it shall be considered as equivalent to 3 credits of the University.
10. The University may also permit its students to accumulate certain credits from other Universities / educational institutions / research institutions in full or partial fulfilment of the required Course work. In such cases:
 - 10.1 the student shall be required to obtain prior approval of the Dean of the School;
 - 10.2 the Courses can be undertaken only in the institutions specified in para 4 above; and

10.3 the maximum number of credits that can be accumulated by a student from other institutions shall not exceed 20% of the total credits prescribed for the successful completion of the Programme of Studies

Based upon statute 22(1) of Central University Act 2009

CENTRAL UNIVERSITY OF PUNJAB

2. ORDINANCE FOR REGULATING LEAVE TO TEACHERS OF THE UNIVERSITY *

1. The following kinds of leave may be admissible to permanent teachers:

- i) **Leave Treated as Duty**
 - Casual Leave
 - Special Casual Leave
 - Duty Leave
- ii) **Leave Earned by Duty**
 - Earned Leave
 - Half Pay Leave
 - Commutated Leave
- iii) **Leave not Earned by Duty**
 - Extraordinary Leave
 - Leave not Due
- iv) **Leave not Debited to Leave Account**
 - a) *Leave for Academic Pursuits*
 - Study Leave
 - Sabbatical Leave
 - b) *Leave on Grounds of Health*
 - Maternity Leave
 - Paternity Leave
 - Adoption Leave
 - Quarantine Leave
 - Child Care Leave

The Executive Council may, in exceptional cases, grant, for the reasons to be recorded, any other kind of leave, subject to such terms and conditions as it may be deemed fit to impose.

2. Casual Leave (CL)

- (i) Casual Leave is not earned by duty. Total casual leave granted to a teacher shall not exceed eight days in an academic year.
- (ii) Casual leave cannot be accumulated, nor it can be combined with any other kind of leave except special casual leave. It may be combined with holidays including Sundays. Holidays/Sundays falling within the period of casual leave shall not be counted as casual leave.

3. Special Casual Leave (SCL)

- (i) Special casual leave not exceeding ten days in an academic year may be granted to a teacher –

- (a) to conduct examination of another university, Public Service Commission, Board of Examination or other similar bodies/institutions;
- (b) to inspect academic institutions attached to a Statutory Board, etc;
- (c) to participate in a literary, scientific or educational conference, symposium or seminar or cultural or athletic activities conducted by Bodies recognized by the University Authorities;
- (d) to do such other work as may be approved by the Vice-Chancellor as academic work.

Note : In computing the ten days leave admissible, the days of actual journey, if any, to and from the places where such conference/activity takes place and holidays/Sundays falling within the period of SCL will be excluded.

- (ii) In addition, special casual leave to the extent mentioned below may also be granted

- (a) to undergo sterilization operation (Vasectomy or Salpingectomy) under Family Planning Programme. Leave in this case will be restricted to six working days.
- (b) to undergo non-puerperal sterilization by a female teacher. Leave in this case will be restricted to fourteen days.

- (iii) Special casual leave cannot be accumulated nor it can be combined with any other kind of leave except casual leave. It may, however, be combined with holidays.

4. Duty Leave (DL)

- (i) Duty leave not exceeding 15 working days in a semester may be granted by the Dean of the School if the duty leave is for academic assignment within India, and by the Vice-Chancellor if it is outside India, for

- (a) Attending conferences/congresses/symposia/seminars and other activities of similar nature, on behalf of the University or where invitations are accepted with the prior approval of the University;
- (b) Delivering lectures in institutions and universities at the invitation of such institutions or universities received by the University and accepted by the Vice-Chancellor; or
- (c) Undertaking field work in India or abroad.

Explanation : The teacher will be treated as on duty (and not requiring duty leave) and consequently the restriction of 15 working days in a semester shall not apply in the following cases:

- (i) Working in another Indian or a foreign University, any other agency, institution or organization when so deputed by the University, or for performing any other duty for the University;
 - (ii) Working as a member of a delegation or committee appointed by the Government of India, State Governments, UGC, Universities or any other academic or public body;
 - (iii) Deputation abroad under cultural/bilateral exchange programme in which it is a condition that the teacher deputed will have to go on duty leave.
- (ii) The leave may be granted on full pay provided that if the teacher receives a fellowship or honorarium or any other financial assistance beyond the amount needed for normal expenses, the person shall remit a predetermined percentage of the amount beyond the limit to the University as per University regulations in this regard.
- (iii) Duty leave may be combined with earned leave, half pay leave or extraordinary leave.

(iv) Duty leave may either be pre-fixed or suffixed to the vacation.

5. Earned Leave (EL)

(i) Earned leave admissible to a teacher shall be at the rate of $1/30^{\text{th}}$ actual service including vacation.

(ii)

(a) The earned leave of 12 days shall be credited in advance to the leave account of a teacher on the first day of January every year.

(b) If a teacher has availed of leave other than casual leave, special casual leave or duty leave, or the period of his/her absence has been treated as *dies non* during the previous year, the credit to be afforded to his/her leave account shall be reduced by $1/30^{\text{th}}$ of the period of such leave.

(c) The credit of earned leave for the calendar year in which a teacher is appointed, shall be done in advance on the first day of the calendar month following the date of his/her joining duty, at the rate of one day for each completed calendar month of service which he/she is likely to render in that year.

(d) The credit of earned leave for the calendar year in which a teacher retires or resigns from service shall be at the rate of one day for each completed calendar month upto date of retirement or resignation.

(e) When a teacher is removed or dismissed from service or dies while in service, credit or earned leave shall be allowed at the rate of one day per completed calendar month up to the end of the preceding calendar month in which he/she is removed or dismissed from service or dies in service.

(iii) The teacher of the University can be on duty upto a maximum of 30 days during the vacation for evaluation work of entrance examination and $1/3^{\text{rd}}$ of the period may be credited to his/her earned leave account. Teachers doing administrative functions like COC of Centre /Dean of School, etc. shall also be entitled for credit of earned leave at the rate of $1/3^{\text{rd}}$ of the period spent on such duties, subject to a maximum of 30 days of earned leave in a calendar year.

(iv) Earned leave at the credit of a teacher shall not accumulate beyond the number specified by Government of India/UGC from time to time. The maximum earned leave that may be sanctioned at a time shall not exceed 60 days. earned leave exceeding 60 days may, however, be sanctioned in the case of higher study or

training or leave on medical grounds or when the entire leave or a portion thereof is spent outside India.

Note :

1. When a teacher prefixes as well as suffixes earned leave to vacation, the period of vacation shall be reckoned as leave for calculating the maximum period of leave on average pay.
2. In case where only a portion of the leave is spent outside India, the grant of leave in excess of 60 days shall be subject to the condition that the portion of the leave spent in India shall not in the aggregate exceed 60 days.
3. Encashment of earned leave shall be allowed to a teacher as applicable to the employees of the Central Government.

6. Half Pay Leave (HPL)

- (i) Every permanent teacher shall be credited with half pay leave in advance, in two installments of ten days each on the first day of January and July of every calendar year.
- (ii) (a) The leave shall be credited to the said leave account at the rate of $5/3$ days for each completed calendar month of service of the year in which the teacher is appointed.
(b) The credit for the year in which a teacher is due to retire shall be allowed at the rate of $5/3$ days per completed calendar month up to the date of retirement.
(c) When a teacher is removed or is dismissed from service or dies while in service, half pay leave in his/her credit shall be adjusted at the rate of $5/3$ days per completed calendar month up to the end of the preceding calendar month in which he/she is removed or dismissed from service or dies in service.

7. Commuted Leave (Com.L)

Commutated leave not exceeding half the amount of half pay leave due may be granted on medical certificate from a registered medical practitioner empanelled by the University to a permanent teacher subject to the following conditions:

- (i) When commuted leave is granted, twice the amount of such leave shall be debited against the half pay leave due.
- (ii) No commuted leave shall be granted under this Ordinance unless the authority competent to sanction leave has reason to believe that the teacher will return to duty on its expiry.
- (iii) Where a teacher who has been granted commuted leave resigns from service or at his/her request is permitted to retire voluntarily without returning to duty, the commuted leave shall be treated as half pay leave and the difference between the leave salary in respect of commuted leave and half pay leave shall be recovered:

Provided that no such recovery shall be made if the retirement is by reason of ill-health incapacitating the teacher for further service or in the event of his/her death.

- (iv) Commuted leave during the entire service shall be limited to a maximum 240 days.

Note : (1) Commuted leave may be granted at the request of the teacher even when earned leave is due to him/her.

(2) The duration of earned leave and commuted leave taken in conjunction shall not exceed 240 days at a time.

8. Extraordinary Leave (EOL)

- (i) A permanent teacher may be granted extraordinary leave
 - (a) When no other leave is admissible; or
 - (b) When other leave is admissible, the teacher applies in writing for the grant of extraordinary leave:
Provided, however, that save under the provisions of sub-clauses (ii) to (iv) below, no extraordinary leave shall be granted to a teacher for holding an appointment or a fellowship outside the University.
- (ii) The Executive Council may grant, on the request from the institution concerned and on application of the teacher, extra-ordinary leave to hold an appointment or a fellowship under a Government, another university, a research institute or other similar institution, if in the opinion of the Executive Council, such leave does not prejudice the interests of the University. This leave may be allowed only to a teacher who has been confirmed in the post held by him/her and has served the University for a period of at least two years:

Provided that the Executive Council may grant exemption for the requirement of two years service in very exceptional cases.

The application for such leave shall be sent through the Dean of the School concerned and the latter shall give his/her recommendation taking into account the strength of teaching staff of the particular subject. At no time more than 20% of the strength of teachers on rolls of a Centre shall be allowed to be absent on extraordinary leave/study leave and/or sabbatical leave.

In case of his/her failure to return to duty immediately at the end of the period of leave sanctioned to him/her the services of a teacher shall be liable to be terminated from the date of commencement of the period of leave granted to him/her.

- (iii) The Executive Council may also grant at its discretion, extraordinary leave to a permanent teacher who has been selected for a teaching or research assignment in another university, a research institute or other similar institution:

Provided he/she has served the University for a period of atleast two years and the application was forwarded by the University. The leave in such cases shall not exceed a maximum period of two years.

- (iv) Subject to the provisions of sub-clause (ix) below, the total period of extraordinary leave granted to a teacher under sub-clauses (ii) and (iii) above shall not exceed five years during his/her entire service:

Provided that the teachers of the University who are given Career Award will be eligible for grant of extraordinary leave for the period of award in addition to the above provisions on the condition that they stay on in the University during the period of this award.

- (v) EOL shall not be granted after return from a previous spell of EOL until after the expiry of :

- ⊙ Three years in case of a teacher who proceeds on EOL for more than one month and less than one year;
- ⊙ Five years in case of a teacher who proceeds on EOL for a period of one year or more.

Provided that no such period of gap shall be applicable to a teacher who proceeds on EOL for less than a month.

(vi) Notwithstanding any other leave which may be due to a teacher, the entire period for which the teacher holds the appointment outside the university shall be without pay. The period so spent shall count for seniority. The period shall not count for pensionary/contributory provident fund benefits unless the pensionary/contributory provident fund contributions are paid by the teacher or the foreign employer.

(vii) Extraordinary leave shall always be without pay and allowances.

(viii) Extraordinary leave shall not count for increment except in the following cases –

(a) Leave taken on medical grounds;

(b) Cases where the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied that the leave was taken due to causes beyond the control of the teacher, such as inability to join or rejoin duty to civil commotion or a natural calamity, provided the teacher has no other kind of leave to his/her credit;

(c) Leave taken for prosecuting higher studies;

(d) Leave granted to accept an invitation to a teaching post or fellowship or research-cum-teaching post or an assignment for technical or academic work of importance.

(ix) Extraordinary leave may be combined with any other leave except casual leave and special casual leave, provided that the total period of continuous absence from duty on leave (including periods of vacation when such vacation is taken in conjunction with leave) shall not exceed three years except in cases where leave is taken on medical grounds. The total period of absence from duty shall in no case exceed five years in the entire period of service of a teacher.

(x) The authority empowered to grant leave may commute retrospectively periods of absence without leave into extraordinary leave.

9. Leave not Due (LND)

(i) Leave not due may, at the discretion of the Vice-Chancellor, be granted to a permanent teacher for a period not exceeding 360 days during the entire period of service, out of which not more than 90 days at a time and 180 days in all may

be otherwise than on medical grounds. Such leave shall be debited against the half pay leave earned by him/her subsequently.

- (ii) Leave not due shall not be granted unless the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied that the teacher will return to duty on the expiry of the leave and earn the leave granted.
- (iii) A teacher granted 'Leave not Due', shall not be permitted to tender resignation from service as long as the debit balance in leave account is not wiped off by active service, or the teacher refunds the amount paid to him/her as pay and allowances for the period not so earned:

Provided that in case where retirement is unavoidable on account of reason of ill health, incapacitating the teacher for further service, refund of leave salary for the period of leave to be earned may be waived by the Executive Council.

Provided further the Executive Council may, in any other exceptional case, waive, for reasons to be recorded, the refund of leave salary for the period of leave still to be earned.

10. Study Leave (SL)

- (i) Study leave may be granted by the Executive Council on the recommendation of the COC of the Centre concerned to a teacher after a minimum of 3 years of continuous service with the University, to pursue a special line of study or research directly related to his/her work in the University or to make special study of the various aspects of University organization and methods of education.
- (ii) The period of study leave may be for a period upto 3 years, but may be granted for a period upto two years in the first instance, extendable by one more year, if there is adequate progress as reported by the Research Guide, provided that the number of teachers given study leave, does not exceed the stipulated percentage of teachers proceeding on leave, in any Centre or the School at a given time, as mentioned under 8(ii) above.
- (iii) The Executive Council may, in the special circumstances of a case, waive the condition of three years service being continuous.

Explanation: In computing the length of service, the time during which a person was on probation or engaged as a Research Assistant/Associate shall be reckoned, provided that the current appointment is in continuation of the previous service as Research Assistant/Associate.

- (iv) Study leave shall not be granted to a teacher who is due to retire within five years from the date on which he/she is expected to return to duty after the expiry of study leave.
- (v) Study leave may be granted not more than twice during a teacher's career. However, the maximum period of study leave admissible during the entire service shall not exceed three years.
- (vi) No teacher who has been granted study leave shall be permitted to alter substantially the course of study or the programme of research without the permission of the Executive Council. When the course of study falls short of study leave, the teacher shall resume duty on the conclusion of the course of study.
- (vii) Subject to the provisions of sub-clauses (ix) and (x) below, study leave may be granted on full pay upto two years extendable by one year at the discretion of the University.
- (viii) The amount of scholarship, fellowship or other financial assistance that a teacher who has been granted leave will not preclude his/her being granted study leave with pay and allowances but the scholarship, etc., so received shall be taken into account in calculating the predetermined percentage of such amount to be remitted to the University if it is beyond the limit fixed by the University. Foreign scholarship/fellowship would be regulated as above only if the fellowship is above a specified amount, which may be determined from time to time. In the case of an Indian fellowship, which exceeds the salary of the teacher, the salary shall not be paid during the fellowship.

Note : While deciding the amount received by a teacher during the period of his/her study leave spent abroad, for calculating the percentage which the teacher may have to remit to the University, the net emoluments rather than the gross emoluments be taken into consideration and the deduction made by the granting agency on account of tax as well as the payment made by the teacher on accommodation during the course of leave spent abroad, may be deducted from the gross emoluments while deciding such amount.

- (ix) Subject to the maximum period of absence from duty on leave not exceeding three years, study leave may be combined with earned leave, half-pay leave, extraordinary leave or vacation.
- (x) A teacher, who is selected to a higher post during study leave, will be placed in that position and get the higher scale only after joining the post.

- (xi) A teacher granted study leave shall, on his/her re-joining the service of the University, be eligible for the benefit of the annual increment(s) which he/she would have earned if he/she had not proceeded on study leave. He/she shall not, however, be eligible to receive arrears of increments.
- (xii) Study leave shall count as service for pension/contributory provident fund, provided the teacher joins the University on the expiry of his/her study leave.
- (xiii) Study leave granted to a teacher shall be deemed to be cancelled in case it is not availed of within 3 months of its sanction or, if to join a course study, within 1 month of the start of the course, whichever is earlier, so that another teacher can be sanctioned such leave, if requested, within the upper limit of 20% of faculty on various kinds of leave at a time.
- Provided that where study leave granted has been so cancelled, the teacher may apply again for such leave.
- (xiv) A teacher availing himself/herself of study leave shall undertake that he/she shall serve the University for a continuous period of at least three years to be calculated from the date of his/her resuming the duty after expiry of study leave.
- (xv) The teacher before availing himself/herself of the study leave, shall execute a bond in favour of the University, binding himself/herself for the due fulfillment of the conditions laid down in these sub-clauses and give security of immovable property to the satisfaction of the Finance Officer or a fidelity bond of an insurance company or a guarantee by a scheduled bank or furnish security of two permanent teachers for the amount which might become refundable to the University in accordance with sub-clause (xvi) below.
- (xvi) The teacher shall submit to the University, six monthly reports of the progress of his/her studies from his/her supervisor or the Head of the Institution. This report shall reach the Registrar within one month of the expiry of every six months of the study leave. If the report does not reach the Registrar within the specified time, the payment of leave salary may be deferred till the receipt of such report.

- (xvii) No teacher proceeding on study leave shall be allowed to resign from his/her employment, unless he/she settles all financial and other claims of the University outstanding against him/her.

11. Sabbatical Leave (Sb.L)

- (i) Permanent whole-time teachers of the University who have completed seven years may be granted sabbatical leave to undertake study or research or other academic pursuits solely for the object of increasing their proficiency and usefulness to the University and higher education system.
- (ii) The duration of leave shall not exceed one year at a time and two years in the entire career of a teacher.
- (iii) A teacher who has availed himself/herself of study leave during the qualifying period preceding sabbatical, would not be entitled to sabbatical leave.

Provided that the sabbatical leave may be granted after the expiry of five years from the date of the teacher's return from the study leave or any other kind of training programme.

- (iv) A teacher shall, during the period of sabbatical leave, be paid full pay and allowances (subject to prescribed conditions being fulfilled) at the rates applicable to him/her immediately prior to his/her proceeding on sabbatical leave.

Note : While deciding the amount received by a teacher during the period of his/her study leave spent abroad, for calculating the percentage which the teacher may have to remit to the University, the net emoluments rather than the gross emoluments be taken into consideration and the deduction made by the granting agency on account of tax as well as the payment made by the teacher on accommodation during the course of leave spent abroad, may be deducted from the gross emoluments while deciding of such amount.

- (v) A teacher during the period of sabbatical leave shall not take up any regular appointment under another organization in India or abroad. He/she may, however, be allowed to accept a fellowship or a research scholarship or ad hoc teaching and research assignment with honorarium or any other form of assistance, other than regular employment in an institution of advance studies.

Provided that in such cases the teacher shall be required to remit to the University the required percentage of the amount received.

- (vi) During the period of sabbatical leave, the teacher shall be allowed to draw the increment on the due date.

Note:

- (1) The programme to be followed during sabbatical leave shall be submitted to the University for approval alongwith the application for grant of leave.
- (2) On return from leave, the teacher shall report to the University within 3 months the nature of studies, research or other work undertaken during the period of leave and the result thereof.

12. Maternity Leave (ML)

- (i) Maternity leave on full pay may be granted to a woman teacher for a period of not exceeding 135 days, to be availed of twice in the entire career. Maternity leave may also be granted in case of miscarriage including abortion, subject to the condition that the total leave granted in respect of this to a woman teacher in her career does not exceed 45 days, and the application for leave is supported by a medical certificate.
- (ii) Maternity leave may be combined with earned leave, half pay leave or extraordinary leave.

13. Paternity Leave (PL)

Paternity leave of 15 days may be granted to a male teacher during the confinement of his wife, provided that such leave shall be limited upto 2 children.

14. Adoption Leave (AL)

- (i) A female teacher, with fewer than two surviving children, on valid adoption of a child below the age of one year may be granted child adoption leave, by an authority competent to grant leave, for a period of 135 days immediately after the date of valid adoption.
- (ii) During the period of Child Adoption Leave, she shall be paid leave salary equal to the pay drawn immediately before proceeding on leave.

- (iii) Child adoption leave may be combined with leave of any other kind.
- (iv) In continuation of child adoption leave the adoptive mothers may also be granted, if applied, for leave of the kind due and admissible (excluding leave not due and commuted leave not exceeding 60 days without production of Medical Certificate) for a period upto one year reduced by the age of the adopted child on the date of legal adoption without taking into account the period of child adoption leave, subject to the following conditions;
 - (a) This facility shall not be admissible to an adoptive mother already having two surviving children at the time of adoption.
 - (b) The maximum period of one year leave of the kind due and admissible (including leave not due and commuted leave upto 60 days without production of Medical Certificate), will be reduced by the age of the child on the date of adoption without taking into account child adoption leave as in following illustration:
 - ⊙ If the age of the adopted child is less than one month on the date of adoption leave upto one year may be allowed.
 - ⊙ If the age of the child is six months and above but less than seven months, leave upto 6 months may be allowed.
 - ⊙ If the age of the child is 9 months and above but less than 10 months, leave upto 3 months may be allowed.
- (v) Child adoption leave shall not be debited against the leave account.

15. Quarantine Leave (QL)

- (i) Quarantine leave is leave of absence from duty necessitated in consequence of the presence of an infectious disease in the family or household of a teacher.
- (ii) Quarantine leave may be granted on medical certificate for a period no exceeding 21 days. in exceptional cases this limit may be raised to thirty days. any leave necessary for quarantine leave may be combined with earned leave, half pay leave or extraordinary leave.

- (iii) A teacher on quarantine leave shall not be treated as absent from duty and his pay shall not be affected.

16. Child Care Leave (CCL)

Child Care Leave can be granted to women teachers having minor children below the age of 18 years, for a maximum period of two years (i.e. 730 days) during their service, for taking care of upto two children whether for rearing or to look after any of their needs like examination, sickness, etc. The leave shall be admissible subject to the following conditions:

- (i) CCL cannot be demanded as a matter of right. Under no circumstances can any teacher proceed on CCL without prior proper approval of the leave by the leave sanctioning authority.
- (ii) The leave is to be treated like the Earned Leave and sanctioned as such. Consequently, Saturdays, Sundays, gazetted holidays etc. falling during the period of leave would also count for CCL, as in the case of Earned Leave.
- (iii) CCL shall be admissible for two eldest surviving children only.
- (iv) The Leave Account for CCL shall be maintained in the prescribed proforma, and it shall be kept along with the service book of the teacher concerned.
- (v) **CCL should not ordinarily be granted during the probation period except in case of certain extreme situations where the leave sanctioning authority is fully satisfied about the need of Child Care Leave to the probationer. It may be ensured that the period for which this leave is sanctioned during probation is minimal.**

17. Vacation

- (i) Vacation may be taken in combination with any kind of leave except casual and special casual leave, provided that vacation shall not be both prefixed and suffixed to leave.
- (ii) Except in special circumstances, vacation and earned leave taken together shall not extend beyond one semester.

- (iii) When a vacation falls between two periods of leave so as to result in a continuous absence from duty during the entire period, such vacation shall be treated as part of the leave.
- (iv) For the vacation period, a teacher shall be entitled to the same pay as when on duty. A teacher will, however, be entitled only to half of such pay if he/she has given notice of resignation and the period of such notice expires during vacation or within one month from the last pay thereof.

18. Teacher Appointed on Probation

A teacher appointed as a probationer against a substantive vacancy and with definite terms of probation shall during the period of probation be granted leave which would be admissible to him/her if he/she has held this post substantively otherwise than on probation. If a person in the permanent service of the University is appointed 'on probation' to a higher post, during probation, he/she shall not be deprived of the benefit of leave rules applicable to his/her permanent post.

19. Teachers Appointed under Statute 19(2)

The teachers appointed by the Executive Council under Statute 19(2) of the Act shall be governed by all the provisions of this ordinance relating to the appointed teachers, except the following:

- (i) They shall not be entitled for sabbatical or study leave.
- (ii) They shall not be entitled for vacation as their work relates to projects.

20. Temporary Teachers

Whole time temporary teachers shall be governed by the provisions of this Ordinance subject to the following conditions and exceptions:

- (i) A temporary teacher shall be entitled casual leave, special casual leave and duty leave on a par with a permanent teacher.
- (ii) Earned Leave
A temporary teacher shall be entitled to earned leave on a par with a permanent teacher.
- (iii) Half Pay Leave

No half pay leave shall be granted to temporary teacher unless the authority competent to sanction leave has reason to believe that the teacher will return to duty on the expiry of such leave.

(iv) Commuted Leave

Temporary teachers shall not be entitled to commute any portion of the half pay leave.

(v) Extraordinary Leave

The duration of extraordinary leave to the temporary teachers shall not exceed the following limits:

(a) Three months at a time;

(b) Six months in cases where the teacher has completed three years continuous service and the leave application is supported by a medical certificate;

(c) Eighteen months where the teacher is undergoing treatment in a recognized hospital for tuberculosis, cancer or leprosy;

(d) 24 months in cases where the leave is required for prosecuting studies, certified to be in the University's interest, provided that the teacher has completed three years continuous service on the date of commencement of extraordinary leave.

A temporary teacher who fails to resume duty on the expiry of the period of extraordinary leave granted to him/her and remains absent from duty, shall, unless the Executive Council, in view of the exceptional circumstances of the case otherwise determines, be deemed to have resigned from his/her service and shall accordingly cease to be a University employee.

(vi) Leave not due, Study Leave and Sabbatical Leave

Temporary teachers shall not be entitled for the grant of leave not due, study leave and sabbatical leave.

(vii) Vacation

(a) A temporary teacher shall be entitled to pay for the following vacation only if he/she joins duty within two months of the beginning of the academic

session and has worked continuously and satisfactorily from the date of joining upto the last working day of the session.

(b) The vacation salary may be paid to the teacher, if the temporary appointment continues for a part or the whole of next academic session and the teacher joins on the opening day; and has also served on the last working day before the vacation.

21. Teacher Appointed on Contract Basis

Teachers appointed on contract basis shall be entitled to leave as under:

- (i) Earned leave/Half pay leave/Casual leave as admissible to whole time temporary teachers of the University.
- (ii)
 - (a) In the case of contract appointments for one year or less, unless on medical grounds, no Extraordinary leave shall be granted.
 - (b) In the case of contract appointments for more than one year but less than 5 years, extraordinary leave as admissible to temporary teachers subject to the condition that the total period of extraordinary leave during the entire contract period shall not exceed 90 days.
 - (c) Where the contract appointment is for 5 years or more, the extraordinary leave shall be as that admissible to the whole time temporary teachers.

22. Honorary and Part Time Teachers

Honorary and part-time teachers of the University shall be entitled to leave on the same terms as are applicable to whole-time temporary teachers of the University.

23. General Conditions Applicable to All Categories of Teachers

- (i) Leave how earned

Leave is earned by duty only. The period spent in foreign service counts as duty if contribution towards leave salary is paid for such period.

- (ii) Right to leave

(c) No leave shall be claimed as matter of right. Leave of any kind may be varied, refused or revoked by the competent authority empowered to grant it without assigning any reason, if that authority considers such action to be in the interest of the University.

(b) No leave shall be granted to a teacher whom a competent authority has decided to dismiss, remove or compulsorily retire from service, nor shall any leave be granted to a teacher who is under suspension.

(iii) Maximum period of absence from duty on leave

(a) No teacher shall be granted leave of any kind for a continuous period exceeding five years.

(b) Where a teacher does not resume duty after remaining on leave for a continuous period of five years or where a teacher after the expiry of his/her leave remains absent from duty, other than on foreign service or on account of suspension, for any period which together with the period of leave granted to his/her exceeds five years, he/she shall unless the Executive Council in view of the exceptional circumstances of the case otherwise determines, be removed from service after following prescribed procedure.

(iv) Application for Leave

Leave should always be applied for in advance and the sanction of the competent authority obtained before it is availed of except in cases of emergency and for satisfactory reasons.

Note: Faculty member should not leave station till the order sanctioning leave has been issued.

(v) Commencement and termination of leave

(a) Leave ordinarily begins from the date on which leave as such is actually availed of and ends on the day the teacher resumes his duty.

(b) Sunday and other recognized holidays may be prefixed and /or suffixed to the leave with the permission of the authority competent to sanction the leave.

(vi) Rejoining of duty before the expiry of the leave

(a) A teacher may return to duty before the expiry of the leave granted to him/her, with the permission of the competent authority.

(b) Notwithstanding anything contained in (a) above, a teacher on leave preparatory to retirement shall be precluded from withdrawing his/her request for permission to retire and from returning to duty, save with the consent of the Executive-Council.

(vii) Leave on medical grounds to be supported by medical certificates

A teacher who applies for leave on medical grounds shall support his/her application with a medical certificate from a Registered Medical Practitioner empanelled by the University. Leave or extension of leave on medical certificate shall not be granted beyond the date on which a teacher is pronounced by a Medical Board constituted by the University for the purpose to be permanently incapacitated for further service.

(viii) Rejoining duty on return from leave on medical ground

No teacher who has been granted leave (other than casual leave) on medical grounds shall be allowed to return to duty without producing a certificate of fitness from the registered medical officer empanelled by the University.

(ix) Employment during leave

A teacher on leave shall not, without the written permission of the University, engage directly or indirectly in any trade or business whatsoever or in any private tuition or other work to which any emolument or honorarium is attached:

Provided that this prohibition shall not apply to work undertaken in connection with the examination of a University, Public Service Commission, Board of Education or similar Bodies/Institutions or to any literary work or publication or radio or extension lectures, or with the permission of the Vice-Chancellor to any other academic work.

The leave salary of a teacher who is permitted to take up any employment during leave shall be subject to such restrictions as the Executive Council may prescribe.

(x) Absence without leave or overstay on leave

A teacher who absents himself/herself without leave or remains absent without leave after the expiry of the leave granted to him/her, shall be entitled to no leave allowance or salary for the period of such absence. Such period shall be debited against his/her leave account as leave is extended by the authority empowered to grant the leave. Willful absence from duty may be treated as misconduct.

(xi) Conversion of one kind of leave to another

(a) At the request of the teacher concerned, the University may convert retrospectively any kind of leave including extraordinary leave into a leave of different kind which was admissible to him/her at the time leave was originally taken, but he/she cannot claim such conversion as a matter of right.

(b) If one kind of leave is converted into another, the amount of leave salary and the allowances admissible shall be recalculated and arrears of leave salary and allowances paid or the amount overdrawn recovered, as the case may be.

(xii) Increment during leave

If increment of pay falls during any leave other than casual leave, special casual leave, duty leave, or sabbatical leave, the effect of increase of pay shall be given from the date the teacher resumes duty without prejudice to the normal date of his/her increment, except in those cases where the leave does not count for increment.

(xiii) Leave year

For the purpose of these Ordinances, unless otherwise specified, the term 'year' shall mean a calendar year.

25. Authorities Empowered to Sanction Leave

The authorities specified in column (2) of the table below are empowered to sanction leave to the extent shown in column (3) thereof. Cases for sanction of leave in excess of these limits or of leave not mentioned below shall be submitted to the Executive Council. Before sanctioning the leave, the sanctioning authority shall ensure that leave asked for is admissible and is at the credit of the teacher concerned.

Provided that where leave involves visit abroad, the competent authority shall be the Vice-Chancellor.

26. Leave Salary

- i. A teacher granted casual leave or special casual leave is not treated as absent from duty and his pay is not interrupted. ii. A teacher on earned leave is entitled to leave salary equivalent to the pay drawn immediately before proceeding on leave.
- iii. A teacher on commuted leave is entitled to leave salary equal to the salary admissible under sub-clause 25(III).
- iv. A teacher on extraordinary leave shall not be entitled to any leave salary.
- v. A teacher on Maternity leave / Paternity leave / Child Care leave and Quarantine leave is entitled to draw the same pay as he/she may be drawing at the time of proceeding on leave.
- vi. Payment of all admissible allowances during leave shall be governed by the provisions of the rules regarding the payment of those allowances.
- vii. During the period of re-employment, the leave salary shall be based on the pay drawn by him/her exclusive of the pension and pension equivalent of other retirement benefits.

27. Cash Payment in lieu of Leave

i. On Superannuation

Where a teacher superannuates on attaining the normal age prescribed for superannuation under the terms and conditions governing his/her service, the authority competent to grant leave shall suo motu authorize encashment of Earned leave, if any, at the credit of the teacher on the date of his/her superannuation, subject to a maximum of 300 days.

ii. Superannuation while under suspension

A teacher, who superannuates while under suspension, shall become eligible for the benefit of cash equivalent of Earned leave at his/her credit on the date of his/her superannuation on conclusion of the proceedings against him/her, if the competent authority decides to reinstate him/her in service and holds that the suspension was wholly unjustified.

iii. Retirement before superannuation

A teacher who retires or is retired from service may be granted suo motu, by the authority competent to grant leave, cash equivalent of leave salary in respect of Earned leave at his/her credit subject to maximum number of days including days in respect of the half pay leave at his/her credit as specified by the Government of India/UGC from time to time, provided this period does not exceed the period between the date on which he/she so retires or is retired from

service and the date on which he/she would have retired in the normal course after attaining the age prescribed for superannuation under the terms and conditions governing his/her service. The cash equivalent shall be equal to the leave salary as admissible for earned leave and/or equal to the leave salary as admissible for half pay leave plus dearness allowance admissible on that leave salary for the first 300 days, at the rates in force on the date the University employee so retires or is retired from service. The pension and pension equivalent of other retirement benefits and ad hoc relief/graded relief on pension shall be deducted from the leave salary paid for the period of half pay leave, if any, for which the cash equivalent is payable. The amount so calculated shall be paid in one lump-sum as a one time settlement. No House Rent Allowance shall be payable:

Provided that if leave salary for the half pay leave component falls short of pension and other pensionary benefits, cash equivalent of half pay leave shall not be granted.

Provided further that a teacher who is retired by University by giving him/her pay and allowances in lieu of notice, cash equivalent of leave salary shall be allowed only for the period of leave excluding that period for which pay and allowances in lieu of notice have been allowed.

iv. Resignation / Termination

(a) Resignation : if a teacher resigns or quits service, he/she may be granted suo motu by the authority competent to grant leave cash equivalent in respect of earned leave at his/her credit on the date of cessation of service, to the extent of half of such leave at his/her credit, subject to a maximum of 150 days.

(b) Termination : Where the services of a teacher are terminated by notice or by payment of pay and allowances, in lieu of notice, or otherwise in accordance with the terms and conditions of his/her appointment, he/she may be granted, suo motu by the authority competent to grant leave, cash equivalent in respect of earned leave at his/her credit on the date on which he/she ceases to be in service subject to maximum of 300 days.

v. Dismissal/Removal

When a teacher is dismissed or removed from service following disciplinary proceedings he/she shall not be eligible for leave encashment.

vi. Teachers appointed on contract

(a) The teachers appointed on contract will suo motu be allowed encashment of earned leave at their credit on the date of termination of contract, subject to the ceiling mentioned below:

Period of Contract	Maximum earned leave for which encashment will be allowed at the time of termination of contract
2 years or less	No encashment
More than 2 years, upto 5 years	30 days
More than 5 years, upto 10 years	60 days
More than 10 years, upto 15 years	90 days
More than 15 years, upto 20 years	120 days
More than 20 years, upto 25 years	150 days
more than 25 years	180 days

(b) The encashment of earned leave as above will, however, be subject to the condition that the total earned leave for which encashment will be allowed together with the earned leave or full pay leave for which encashment had been allowed in previous appointments, if any, under the Government, an autonomous body or bodies of public sector undertaking(s), is not more than 300 days.

vii. Leave encashment when permanently incapacitated

A teacher who is declared by a duly constituted Medical Board to be completely and permanently incapacitated for further service may be granted, suo motu, by the authority competent to grant leave, cash equivalent of leave salary in respect of earned leave due and admissible on the date of his/her invalidation from service subject to leave salary for a maximum 300 days. The cash equivalent thus payable shall be equal to the leave salary as calculated under clause (ix) below.

viii. Leave encashment of a teacher who dies while in harness

In case a teacher dies in harness, the cash equivalent of the leave salary that the deceased teacher would have got, had he/she gone on earned leave, but for the

death, due and admissible on the date immediately following the date of death subject to a maximum of leave salary for 300 days shall be paid to his/her family.

ix. Calculation of cash equivalent of leave

The cash equivalent of leave shall be calculated and payable in one lump sum as a one-time settlement as per Government of India rules.

28. Making of Rules and Prescribing the Procedure to be Followed Under this Ordinance

The University may make rules and procedures for effecting the provisions of this Ordinance.



MINUTES OF THE THIRTY EIGHTH MEETING OF THE BUILDING ADVISORY COMMITTEE HELD AT CITY CAMPUS ON 8TH SEPTEMBER, 2017 AT 1430 HRS.

The Thirty Eighth Meeting of the Building Advisory Committee was held on 8th September, 2017 at City Campus of Central University of Punjab, Bathinda. The following members were present in the meeting:

The Chairman and Vice-Chancellor, Central University of Punjab extended a warm welcome to the members to the 38th meeting of Building Advisory Committee. He requested Member Secretary to present the Agenda Items for deliberations and decisions.

The Member Secretary, Dr. Jagdeep Singh presented the Agenda Items and the discussion/ decisions were as under:-

Item: BAC: 38:2017:1

To confirm the minutes of the Thirty Seventh Meeting of Building Advisory Committee.

The Member Secretary informed that the Minutes of the 37th meeting were circulated to all the members of BAC and since no comments from the members were received therefore the minutes as circulated may be approved.

Accordingly the BAC approved the minutes of 37th meeting of BAC held on 14.06.2017 (Annexure – 38.1).

RESOLVE:

The committee noted and approved the minutes of the 37th meeting of Building Advisory Committee held on 14.06.2017

Item: BAC: 38:2017:2

To consider the Action Taken Report (ATR) on the decisions of Thirty Seventh Meeting of the Building Advisory Committee.

The ATR on the decisions taken in the Thirty Seventh Meeting of the Building Advisory Committee, held on 14-06-2017, was examined by the committee. The observations of BAC are :

- i. EIL was advised to present a realistic time schedule for completion of Phase -1A and 1B urgently. Since CUPB would commence its next academic session in the new campus from July 2018 onwards therefore the buildings must be handed over to the University in a stage wise manner commencing from February - 2018 and up to May 2018. The time schedule to be given by EIL should have stage wise milestones and sequence in which the various buildings would be handed over to CUPB in a progressive manner
- ii. It was noted that EIL had taken action to get some samples of the material being used at site from SRM Lab, New Delhi. EIL was advised to submit the test reports received from SRM to the University for reference and record.
- iii. The issue of providing tinted or insulated glass in some windows of



- the Academic Block, as proposed by the Architect for obtaining GRIHA –IV rating, was discussed. Since the Architect had not provided provisions of these items in the present contract therefore these would be extra item resulting into additional expenditure. It was therefore decided that the Architect & PMC should present the status of GRIHA –IV compliance in the next BAC meeting along with scores allotted to various activities. The Architect would justify the requirement of insulated glass in this presentation.
- iv. The committee noted that the Architect had not submitted the revised drawings for converting the open area in the Pavilion into a useable area for the University. The Committee decided that the Pavilion Block would be restricted to Five Storeys. Further the Architect was instructed to submit the revised drawings within ten days failing with EIL shall take necessary action to get the drawings prepared from an alternative source.
- v. The proposal of Air Conditioning in the Academic Block, Guest House and other places was discussed. It was noted that Architect had proposed a central Air Conditioning Scheme for the Academic Block vide letter dated 05-08-2017. After detailed discussions it was decided that the Academic Block may be provided with a Central Air Conditioning System preferably with the latest technology. The Architect was directed to submit the proposal of Air Conditioning of Academic Block along with estimates through EIL for approval of CUPB. Similarly a suitable Air Conditioning system for the Guest House would also be submitted by the Architect through EIL. Both the proposals of Air Conditioning system must be submitted to the University within the next Ten days.
- vi. The details of proposed LED fittings in lieu of CFL fittings were not submitted by the Architect through EIL. The committee advised that the LED fittings should be of latest technology, energy efficient and with a substantial guarantee period. The Architect and EIL were directed to submit the details in the next Ten days.

RESOLVE:

The Building Advisory Committee noted the Action Taken Report and issued instruction for compliance on various issues as detailed above by Architect & EIL.

Item: BAC: 38:2017:3

To discuss and confirm the minutes of the Twenty Ninth Meeting of Sub Committee of Building Advisory Committee.

The Minutes of the Twenty Ninth (29th) Meeting of Sub Committee of Building Advisory Committee held on 14th July 2017 were pursued by the BAC. All the recommendations made by SCBAC were approved for further implementations.



RESOLVE:

The committee approved the minutes of the 29th meeting of Sub Committee of Building Advisory Committee held on 29th March 2017 (Annexure - 38.3).

Item: BAC: 38:2017:4

To discuss and confirm the Minutes of the meeting held between CUPB, EIL & PSDA on 24th July, 2017 at AIU House, New Delhi to discuss the provisions of Internal and External Services including Electrical Services.

The Member Secretary informed the members that a meeting was held in New Delhi between CUPB, EIL, PSDA and KSMB on 24th July 2017 during which Architect was asked to present an overall scheme of all the external services proposed in the Phase 1A & 1B works. He further stated that during the meeting it was noted that there were many aspects in the external services which were not clear and Architect was asked to submit further clarifications and details.

Thereafter, some issues of concern were discussed as below:

i. Electrical works:

A 66 KVA bulk HT power connection was proposed to be obtained from PSPCL. The members enquired about the type of Tariff Chargeable from the University. The committee was of the view that since CUPB is a fully funded by Central Government therefore, the tariff plan for power charges should be domestic. The University Engineers were instructed to check the details from PSPCL. Further the members advised that the electrical connection to the residential unit should be provided directly by PSPCL. The committee advised CUPB to approach PSPCL accordingly.

ii. Storm Water:

The scheme of Storm water drainage was discussed. It was noted that the Architect had proposed the disposal of the Storm water in to 5-6 ponds along the boundary wall at various places in the Green Belt in the Campus based on the assumption that the water would percolate in the ground through natural process. The committee did not agree with this arrangement because the water percolation in this area would be very slow and time consuming due to high water table resulting into the entire campus getting flooded during heavy rains. The committee advised that the Architect should revise the overall storm water drainage system by providing one/two ponds for collection of water with a provision for disposal into external open areas during heavy rains. Further these ponds should have Rain Water Harvesting System to ensure recharging of the sub soil water. The Architect and PMC would submit a detailed proposal in the next 10 days.



iii. **Water Supply:**

The Architect informed that the main source of water supply to the campus would be from the adjoining irrigation canal. This supply would be supplemented by the underground sub soil water provided its quality was acceptable. It was noted that the water from the canal or underground water would require to be treated for usage in the campus. The members advised that suitable water treatment plant should be provided after testing the water quality available from the canal as well as from bore wells. The Architect and EIL would present a firm proposal within 10 days.

iv. **Road Network:**

The Member Secretary informed the committee that the Architect was directed in the meeting held on 24th July 2017 to provide the basis for deciding the width of the roads i.e. Right of Way as well as the Structural calculations based on which the roads sections and its thicknesses were designed for particular class the wheel loads. However, the Architect had failed to provide any details for last one and half months despite reminders. The member thereafter examined the Right of Way Proposed by the Architect for the Main Road and other roads in the campus. EIL informed that the main Road is 40 Metres wide consisting of 14 metres of Bitumen pavements, 6 metres of Concrete cycle paths and 16 metres of footpaths. The secondary roads in the campus have a width of 20 metres consisting of 6 metres of Bitumen pavements, 6 metres of Cycle Paths and 8 meters of footpaths. The member was of the view that the widths of the roads were much more than required and must be reduced. After discussions, it was decided that the main road would have a total width of 24 metres in lieu of 40 metres. The 24 Metres width would consist of 14 Metres of Pavements, 6 Metres of Footpaths with 4 Metres median. The Secondary roads would be 12 metres in lieu of 20 metres. The 12 metres width would consist of 6 metres of Pavements and 6 metres of Footpaths. All the levels of the roads and Footpaths etc. would remain unchanged as many services had already been laid down. The other roads having 12 meters of ROW would remain unchanged.

It was also decided by the Committee all the road pavements inside the campus should be concrete pavements instead of Bitumen Pavements for ensuring more durable, stronger and maintenance free roads. RCM EIL informed that EIL had standard designs available for concrete roads in the large campuses. He recommended Type -1 RCC Pavements which could take Single Axle Load up to 12 Tonnes. This was agreed by BAC and EIL was directed to provide RCC pavement of Type - 1 as per EIL standard designs including the Sub Base and Sub Grade etc. The Sub Base already laid down by the contractor at some places would be utilised by EIL appropriately. The committee was informed that due to rationalisation of roads width ,as per above, there would be an approximate net cost



saving of about Rs. 3 Crores in the road network after considering the additional expenditure on the RCC pavements instead of Bitumen pavements.

The Committee also directed since the Architect had not provided the road designs and details and EIL was providing its standard road designs therefore no fee for the road network shall be paid to the Architect.

RESOLVE:

The Building Advisory Committee noted the minutes of the meeting dated 24-07-2017 and issued instruction for modifications and compliance by Architect & EIL on issues of external services as detailed above.

Item: BAC: 38:2017:5

To discuss and confirm the Minutes of the 30th Meeting of Sub Committee of Building Advisory Committee.

The committee noted and approved the recommendations of the 30th meeting of the Sub Committee of Building Advisory committee including the SCBAC agenda item no. 30:2017:5 containing rates for extra items as per sub Item no. I, ii & iii.

Regarding sub item no. iv for cupboards in Guest House, Residential Block, Hostel Block & Dinning Area it was noted that no details had been supplied by the Architect so far. The committee instructed M/s PSDA to provide the details within seven days failing with CUPB would request GZSCET for providing the details of cupboards/modular kitchen.

As the stage of construction of buildings was at an advanced stage BAC authorised that services of GZSCET be obtained in all cases where the Architect fails to provide drawings or decisions.

RESOLVE:

1. The committee approved the minutes of the 30th meeting of Sub Committee of Building Advisory Committee held on 7th September 2017 at (Annexure - 38.5).
2. M/s PSDA to provide the details of Cupboards/Modular Kitchens within 7 days failing with CUPB to get the necessary drawings and details from GZSCET.
3. Assistance from GZSCET would be taken in all such cases where the Architect fails to provide the details and drawings keeping in view the advance stage of the construction of buildings.



Item: BAC:38:2017:6

To discuss the progress and monitoring work of construction of main campus for Phase-1A with respect to schedule and PERT chart already submitted by PMC (Annexure-38.6).

Mr. B. C. Pant, RCM EIL site presented the progress report of Phase -1A. The up to date construction progress of work was 47.6 % up to 31.08.2017 against stipulated progress of 100% (Annexure 38.6). EIL projected the completion date of Phase -1A as 31.03.2018. EIL was advised to present a realistic time schedule for completion of Phase -1A urgently. The time schedule should have stage wise milestones and sequence in which the various buildings would be handed over to CUPB in a progressive manner. Since CUPB would commence its next academic session in the new campus from July 2018 onwards therefore the buildings must be handed over to the University in a progressive manner commencing from February 2018 and up to May 2018. EIL was asked to submit the revised PERT chart within the next ten days.

The matter regarding tender inputs for the balance items of the work was also discussed with EIL and Architect. Architect promised to submit the balance details by 12-09-2017 and EIL intimated that thereafter they require four months for processing and allotment of the tender and five months for the execution. The committee instructed EIL to complete the tender processing and execution within 6 months so that the new campus buildings could be made functional at the earliest.

EIL informed the BAC that no hindrance exists at site and the contractor was required to mobilise and increase all the resources including the man power at site. Mr D K Pandey, Site Engineer of M/o KSMB stated that manpower was being increased in a progressive manner and would be completed by next week. He requested approval of the balance extra items as well as extension of time for completion of work as requested by them to EIL on 22-08-2017. The EIL was advised by the Committee to process the balance extra items immediately and submit recommendations to CUPB for grant of extension of time to the contractor. RCM, EIL informed that the Extension of Time request of the contractor was already being processed and EIL's recommendations were likely to be submitted to CUPB within the next four weeks. M/s KSMB requested that no liquidated damages may be withheld from their running bills by EIL till a decision on grant of extension of time to them was decided by EIL/CUPB as KSMB required all the resources and cash flow to expedite the completion of works.

Taking into account the present situation the Committee advised EIL that pending a decision on the extension of time application of KSMB recovery on account of liquidated damages be kept in abeyance till 15-10-2017.



from the contractor's bills. Further EIL must ensure that its recommendations are submitted to CUPB well in time for taking a decision in the matter by 15 October 2017.

EIL was requested to inform CUPB about the financial implications on the project due to implementation of GST from July 1, 2017.

RESOLVE:



Mr. S. Balakumar, Project Manager EIL presented the progress report of Phase - 1A.. The up to date cumulative progress of work was 56.1 upto 31.05.2017 against cumulative progress of 100% (Annexure 37.5). He projected the completion date of Phase -1A as 31.05.2018. The Chairman of BAC stated that this final date of completion was not acceptable as CUPB would require the campus much earlier to commence the new session of 2018 19 from the Main Campus. The members were of the view that since the structures were near completion therefore the contractor must complete the balance work within the next 9 months. EIL was advised to revise the completion date to 31.03.2018 and also take the contractor in confidence. It was decided that EIL would confirm the completion date of 31.03.2018 with stage wise handing over of the buildings commencing from November 2017 based on priorities already decided by CUPB.

BAC members asked about the status of test conducted from SRM labs, The representative of EIL informed the committee members that tests randomly are being conducted from SRM Labs. The BAC members asked EIL to get the test of material done from SRM labs regularly even at extra cost to CUPB.

CUPB officials visited the site of construction on 13-06-2017 and it was found that the progress of the external services was very slow which should be expedited.

The Architect representative presented the status of layout plan drawings of Academic Block and stated that these detailed drawings were based on preliminary drawings earlier approved by CUPB. He requested that these drawings may be



approved by CUPB so that Architect could give the drawings, estimate and tender inputs to EIL. After discussions, it was decided that CUPB would convey approval/comments by 16.06.2017 and there after a meeting would be held in EIL office on 20.06.2017 to finalise all the issues.

The Architect presented the preliminary estimate for interior work of Smart Class rooms and Seminar Hall. The Committee advised that these preliminary estimate may be forwarded to EIL for examination and confirmation. Similarly the Architect proposal on the Signage was agreed in principle by the committee and he was asked to submit the detailed drawings and estimate to EIL for review and finalisation. Further for achieving GRIHA norms the Architect informed that South Facing side of the Academic Block Building would need either tinted Glass or double insulated glass unit or film on the existing glass provision in the contract. After discussions, it was decided that Architect will identify the places where these alternative have been provided and these would be vetted by CUPB Engineer before taking a final view in the matter.

The Architect requested for a decision on the design of RCC Jaali to be provided in the Academic Block in front of toilet, staircases and Pavilion. The Chairman stated that he has already advised the Architect that no RCC Jaali would be permitted in the Academic Block due to the fact that they require high level of maintenance. As regards the pavilion, the member advised that this block should be restricted to five floors and it should be enclosed space with aluminium glazing for usage by CUPB for various purposes. Further these spaces should have electrical lights, fans and provision for Air-conditioning. The Architect was advised to revise the drawings and put up with in the next seven days. As regards Jalli at other places other alternative including MS Jaali would be considered and Architect to submit the details accordingly.

During discussion the members advised that the good quality sanitary fixture & fittings should be used which would be maintenance free. EIL informed that Sanitary fittings of the Jacquar make were provided in the contract.

The BAC also advised EIL & Architect to check and confirm the provision of ACs in Academic Block and also all balconies should be accessible from inside of the room.



Prof. Jagdeep Singh, Registrar welcomed all the members and thanked the members for their help and useful inputs. He apprised the members that earlier in the morning he along with Er. N K Verma visited the site and inspected the status of various buildings and external services in the Main Campus at Ghudda and held discussions with officials of EIL, PDSA & KSMB & Sons. He stated that the following specific issues were discussed at site:

- (A) The proposed system of waste disposal in toilets of all buildings of Phase-1A.
- (B) Scope of work of all internal services including electrical and air conditioning systems in all the buildings as well as external services within the campus.
- (C) Provision of cupboards in the Residences, Hostels Rooms and woodwork in kitchens.
- (D) Proposed library, reception, children room, common room, shop etc on the ground floor of E-Type Housing Tower.
- (E) Proposed Kota Stone in window sills.
- (F) Balance portion of interconnecting approach road to Academic Block yet to be constructed as per the drawings.

He requested that all the above issues may be discussed along with the other agenda items. Thereafter the discussions on the Agenda Items, initiated by Member Secretary, were as under:-

To finalise the pattern and colour of the vitrified floor tiles for various Phase-1A(Sec A & Sec B) buildings of Main Campus, Central University of Punjab, Bathinda.

The details of different patterns and designs of vitrified tile flooring for Academic Block, PG Hostel(Men & Women), Student Dinning, Staff Residences and Guest House as submitted by M/s PSDA architect were deliberated & discussed in detail with reference to the samples of tiles provided by M/s KSMB & Sons. Item: SCBAC: 29:2017:2

To discuss reconfirmation submitted by EIL on Extra items claim No. 6, 7 & 8 of M/s KSMB & Sons already approved in 37th Meeting of BAC.

The committee noted the clarifications submitted by EIL and recommended as under:-

1. Item No. 6 pertaining to MS Hold Fast:

M/s EIL submitted that the extra item rates for MS hold fast were based on the actual cost of material & labour with the coefficients of CPWD DSR analysis of rates. Mr Prem Sagar, University Engineer stated that since the contractor had included WCT & labour cess @ of 6 % & 1% in the cost of material of hold fast therefore this should not have been allowed extra separately by EIL. After discussions the committee recommended that the rate of Rs. 137/each for MS Hold Fast after deleting the extra WCT be admitted against the EIL recommended rates of Rs 144/each.

2. Item No. 7 pertaining to additional height in shuttering:

The committee was informed that EIL had permitted the erecting of Scaffolding & other related formwork by the contractor from the raft foundation itself for casting the ground floor roof without backfilling with available excavated earth in order to save time. However the project completion had been delayed abnormally. Since PMC had instructed the erection of shuttering from the raft foundation itself, the committee desired that EIL should place on record the cost versus benefits gained by doing so. Further reasons for not obtaining CUPB approval in advance before incurring extra expenditure should also be given by EIL. The committee noted that since the contractor had executed the extra item as per instructions of EIL therefore the recommended rates of Rs. 165/ be admitted and approved.

3. Item No. 8 pertaining to carriage of surplus earth:

The details of the clarification submitted by EIL were examined by the members. The committee disagreed with the EIL's submissions and was of the view the loading & unloading was already included in the contract item. The committee stated that the EIL recommended rates of extra item rates be reduced by 10% and then admitted. Further EIL be asked to work out the actual implication of deleting loading & unloading from the extra item rates and resubmit for approval.

Item No: SCBAC: 29:2017:3

To discuss and review the progress of construction of the Main Campus for Phase-1A works with EIL & contractor M/s KSMB & Sons.



The slow progress & bottlenecks in the construction of the Main Campus of Phase-1A buildings of Main Campus were noted by the committee members. It was brought out that M/s KSMB had indicated in the meeting held in EIL office on 30 June 2017 that the Phase 1A works would be completed by 30 May 2018. Mr. N K Verma said that since Phase 1B works were stipulated to be completed by 30 June 2018 therefore CUPB would be able to occupy all the buildings under construction by June 2018. He suggested that planning for completion of all activities should be done backwards from June 2018. These activities would consist of many items, which were not included in the scope of M/s KSMB, but would be required to make the buildings functional. The Architect and PMC must highlight these activities with a road map for their timely implementation.

The issues highlighted by Dr Jagdeep Singh Registrar and Mr N K Verma, Member BAC during the site visit earlier in the day were discussed in details and the following decisions emerged:

- (A) The sewerage and waste water disposal system proposed by the Architect under the upper floor roof slabs was found to be very unsatisfactory. There were several bends and turns in the piping which would make the maintenance of the toilets in future almost impossible. The Committee advised that EIL and PDSA should propose a suitable scheme urgently as the present proposed scheme was not workable and hence rejected.
- (B) Neither EIL nor the Architect was able to explain the scope of internal and external services in the buildings and the campus. It was decided that the Architect and PMC should make a presentation before CUPB officials immediately about the services proposed in the project. The Committee was informed that a meeting in this regard would be held in Delhi on 24 July 2017.
- (C) It was informed no provision of woodwork for cupboards in rooms & kitchen of residences and Hostel rooms were provided in the contract of M/s KSMB. EIL and PDSA officials were neither aware nor could give any reasons for this omission. The committee members observed that the cupboards in the residential houses were essential & stated that design and drawings for cupboards in residences & hostel rooms must be immediately provided by the Architect failing with CUPB should get them designed from any other Government Organisation in Bhatinda.
- (D) The members observed that the housing tower E was not a standalone structure and would be part of the entire campus. Therefore it need not have separate library and common room etc. The committee recommended that the entire GF should have the same residential units as first floor.
- (E) As regards the Kota stone on window sills the committee noted that the windows consisted of powder coated Aluminium windows. Therefore the window sills should have better finishing materials for improved hygiene and ease of maintenance. The Committee recommended that window sills in academic block be in black granite stone and Udaipur Green in residential areas.
- (F) As far as the balance portion of interconnecting approach road to Academic Block was concerned the committee members were informed that this part of the road would cost about Rs 4 crores and further this was not included in the present

contract. The committee was of the view that balance portion of interconnecting approach road to Academic Block was not required presently and the Academic Block could be easily connected through already proposed road along the Boundary Wall. It was decided that the Architect and PMC would be instructed accordingly.

Item No: SCBAC: 29:2017:4

To discuss M/s PSDA Architect's response to the decision of 37th BAC regarding restricting the pavilion of the Academic Block into five storey structure etc. etc.

The response of M/s PSDA vide letter dated 03.07.2017 was placed before the Committee. The members did not agree with the Architect's submissions and were of the view that the decision taken in the 37th BAC meeting regarding restricting the pavilion of Academic Block up to five storey structure and further enclosing the space with Aluminium Glazing, electrical fan and AC provisions etc. should be implemented as it was a large area which must be utilised properly. The Committee recommended that PMC and Architect may be instructed accordingly.

Item: SCBAC: 29:2017:5

The members stated that the suggestions given by Er. N K Verma, were facilitating immensely the construction of the CUPB Main Campus at Ghudda. It was unanimously proposed that since Er. N K Verma was already a Member of Planning Board as well as BAC of CUPB he may be co-opted as regular Member of BAC Sub Committee also to ensure his continuous participation in its meetings



As per your mail dated 24.8.17, we have been instructed regarding road works as follows:

CUPB advised to construct road, only for Motor vehicle plying portion and remaining portion of Footpath, Cycle track portion to be kept under hold till further instructions. Also first layer of GSB only to be done till further advise from CUPB. For information and necessary action of all concerned.

If this is done in an arbitrary manner, there can be serious concerns with regard to safety of cyclists & pedestrians in the campus.

Street sections have been designed after a careful study and consideration of campus's current and future requirement. Therefore any change in execution of street section needs to be a carefully considered to not to have adverse impact as campus develops in future.

We would therefore require clarification regarding intent mentioned in the above point so that we may revert accordingly.

Minutes of the meeting held between CUPB, EIL & PSDA ON 24 July 2017 at, AIU House, 16 Comrade Inderjit Gupta Marg (Kotla Marg), Opposite National Bal Bhawan, Near ITO, New Delhi – 110002 at 11:00 a.m. for construction of Phase-1A and 1B of Central University of Punjab, Bathinda.

Dr Jagdeep Singh, Registrar (CUPB) welcomed all the officials from M/s EIL and M/s PSDA. He stated that during the visit of CUPB officials to the site recently neither the PMC nor the representatives of M/s PSDA could explain in detail the provisions of services made in Academic Block as well external services in the new campus and therefore there was a need to revisit the proposed services in the campus. He said that this meeting had been organised to broadly understand the various external services proposed by the Architect in the new CUPB campus at Bathinda, Punjab which was under construction.

Thereafter, the discussions were as under:

1. Presentation by M/s PSDA

Mr Pradeep Sachdeva, Architect, M/s PSDA and his services consultant made a presentation of the proposed electrical, sewerage, water supply and storm water systems in the campus. The following issues emerged:

A. Electrical Works

It was informed by the Architect that a bulk 66 KV HT power connection would be obtained from Electricity Board of Punjab and the supply to the University would be at 11 KV. He further stated that substations of 11 KV at various locations in the University were being provided based on the existing requirements. It was brought out by CUPB officials that there the campus would have a residential colony also and the electrical

supply to this colony should be through a LT connection as the residents would be required to pay the electricity charges based on domestic category tariffs. It was further informed to M/s EIL and the Architect that the electricity has to be supplied at the same rate to CUPB at which it would be charged from residents and therefore a specific request in this regard must be made to electricity authorities.

B. Sewerage System

It was informed by M/s PSDA that since only a part of the campus was being developed presently therefore sewage system was being provided accordingly. The Architect stated that as and when the further expansions would be undertaken by the University the sewage system in the new portions could be added to systems of earlier phases. An STP of adequate capacity had been proposed and the treated water from this plant would be utilised for horticulture as well as toilets in the buildings.

C. Storm Water

M/s PSDA explained the proposal storm water system and informed that in the absence of any external drainage system of the Municipal Authority the excess storm water would be stored at several places in the campus through a number of ponds near the boundary walls of the campus. He said that the accumulated water from these ponds would percolate to the ground gradually. CUPB officials were not convinced with this arrangement and stated that during heavy rains there could be a flood like situation in the campus. It was suggested to M/s EIL and M/s PSDA that the system of disposal of storm water should be reviewed.

D. Water Supply

The Architect presented a broad scheme of water supply in the campus. The members were informed that main source of fresh water supply would be through the irrigation canal adjoining the campus. This water would be treated before supplying in the campus. The Registrar mentioned that quality of the canal water must be checked vis-à-vis the ground water quality and accordingly a suitable treatment plant should be proposed by the Architect. It was decided that the Architect and PMC would collect fresh water samples from the canal as well as from the bore wells in the campus and get them tested. Thereafter, a suitable treatment of water should be proposed by the Architect/ PMC. It was also informed by CUPB officials that the Canal remains closed for about 20 days in a year for maintenance. Therefore, adequate quantity of storage would be required if the source of potable water was the irrigation canal only.

E. Road Network


CUPB officials noted that a road network had been proposed in the campus by M/s PSDA. The Architect was asked the basis on which the right of way of the major as well as secondary roads was provided in the campus. The CUPB officials also sought the basis of the proposed road construction especially with respect to load carrying capacity of the campus roads. The Architect was requested to provide the details of

the traffic study in relation to the ROW of the roads in the campus. M/s PSDA agreed to provide the required details immediately.

F. Drain Point Assembly Issue in Toilets

The details of Drain Assembly in toilets were discussed. M/s PSDA was appraised of operational and maintenance difficulty likely to be faced by the maintenance staff. M/s PSDA was of the firm view that no difficulty of chocking of the drain assembly will occur. CUPB was not convinced that the system was workable and advised EIL to review the system.

The meeting ended with votes of thanks.

A. Chemical Anchor Fastener for Parapet:

Mr. B. C. Pant, RCM, EIL Site explained that as per the latest drawings received from the Architect, the construction of parapets on the terrace of Various Buildings require anchoring to the existing slab/beam in some parts of the academic block and other buildings. For anchoring the reinforcement to the RCC slab Chemical Anchor Fasteners are required for providing structural stability. He further stated that the contractor had submitted an extra item of Rs. 11.95 Lacs for providing Chemical Anchor fasteners. However the rates are yet to be examined by EIL which would take some time. He requested that at this stage, CUPB may give 'in principle' approval for commencement of the work and EIL would submit the extra item rates after checking subsequently for seeking CUPB approval.







The following extra item submitted by contractor in reference to clause 66 of SSC of contract is forwarded to you along with the approximate cost implication for your principle approval.

1. Extra item on chemical re-baring- HILTY-HIT-HY 200: As per earlier approved GFC drawing ornamental brickwork was shown in the parapet of building terrace. The contractor has claimed for the extra cost and extra time for the construction of ornamental brick parapet as the same is not included in SOR item. The matter was discussed in various meetings along with CUPB representative and it was decided to change the design of parapet wall to simple brick wall along with RCC column and Tie beam to ensure the safety at terrace level. Accordingly architect revised the drawing and the revised drawing was issued for construction to contractor on 30.05.17.

The revised drawing necessitates the chemical rebaring of parapet column bar to the already cast terrace slab. SOR item of contract has no provision for chemical rebaring. Contractor has submitted the extra item on this account vide their letter no. KSMB/EIL/BHATINDA-01/0707/2017 dated 07.07.2017 (copy attached). Out of the two type of chemical rebaring as submitted by the contractor, the structural consultant of architect has selected the HIT-HY-200 type chemical anchoring, therefore we are forwarding the extra item accordingly for your principle approval. We have reviewed its tenability in line with contract and CPWD specification and found that extra item submitted by contractor is tenable for payment.





A) Academic block:-

- 1) The window opening left in Lab and Class rooms facing main corridor side to be fully closed to avoid any distraction to students as apprehended by CUPB officials. **Architect to incorporate in drawings.**
- 2) The inside partition wall in Lab and class room to be made 230 thk wth Fly ash bricks Instead of clay bricks wall. **For information and necessary action of all concerned.**
- 3) The main control switch board to be provided outside of rooms connecting DBs located inside. This is required to control the electrical system from outside of rooms in case of any exigencies. The symmetry as far as possible shall be followed while installing the boards. **For information and necessary action of all concerned.**
- 4) It was observed that there is no drainage system available for Lab facility. The detail is to be developed for implementation at site. **Architect to develop the drawings.**
- 5) To drain out water from Lab and class room suitable spout with jalli may be provided. Suitable Spout for drainage to be provided on balcony side of Class/Lab rooms. **Architect to develop the drawings.**
- 6) M/s CUPB officials advised to look into possibility of providing spout pipes and closing the gap at ends of the parapet/sitting arrangement in various floors at corridor. **Architect to look into matter and develop a comprehensive arrangement including proper disposal of the surface water.**

B) PG Hostel:-

Please note that, CUPB vide trailing mail has restricted the construction of road work in motor vehicle carriage way up to laying of first layer of GSB grade-1 only. The work in other front of ROW like footpath, cycle track etc. has also been put on hold till the required clarification is provided by you to them. In the present scenario when the road work construction is in progress as per issued GFC drawing, the road construction work by contractor cannot be restricted as above unless it is conveyed to them in writing. The stoppage of work/restriction of work will be counted as hindrance to work. 1.0 AC System

1.1 Three undermentioned options of AC System are being considered for Air Conditioning of various areas of Academic Block, Central University of Punjab, Bhatinda.

1. Option 1 - Central Water Cooled Ch Water System to be located on Terrace with AHUS on individual Floors.
2. Option 2 - Central Air Cooled Ch Water System to be located on Terrace with AHUS on Individual floors.
3. Option 3 - Central VRV System (Air Cooled) with outdoor units on Terrace & Cassette/ Wall mounted /ductible Type – evaporator in individual areas.

1.2 In the report on AC system dt. July 29, 2017 for Auditorium & 2 Nos. Seminar Halls (Part of Academic Block) Air Cooled chilled water system was proposed only for these areas.

1.3 In case Chilled Water Central plant is considered, it is understood that a Common Central plant for balance areas as well as Auditorium & 2 Nos. Seminar Halls will be provided.

1.4 In case of VRV System (Option 3 Above), it will be recommended to retain the Central Air Cooled system for Auditorium & 2 Nos, Seminar Halls with AHUS as planned for undermentioned reasons:

- a) Better & effective air distribution as these are increased height areas.
- b) Better suitability of low side equipment for higher fresh air requirements as these are densely occupied areas.

2.0 AC Load

2.1 Enclosed is Annexure I giving details of total estimated AC connected load including Auditorium & 2 Nos. Seminar Halls which comes to approx. 804 TR.

3.0 Plant Capacities

3.1 Plant Capacities proposed for 3 options are as follows:

1. Option 1 - Central Ch W System with water Cooled Chillers, CHW, CW pumps, Cooling Towers & AHUS – 3 X 300 TR (2 W + 1 S)
2. Option 2 - Central Ch W System with Air Cooled Chillers & AHUS-3 X 300 TR (2 W + 1 S) Actual capacity (Considering Derating of Air Cooled machines on high ambient temperature in Summer season) with CHW Pumps & AHUS.

6.1 It would be ideal to go in for Central Water Cooled AC System in case Water of good/acceptable quality is available from waste water management system. App. Water requirements of AC plant shall be 20,000 US gallons/day based on 12 hrs working/day. Max hardness of water shall be 80 to 100 ppm.

6.2 Otherwise, it would be better to go in for Central Chilled water Air Cooled system as advantages of better diversity for Central Ch W system shall be available.

Dear Sir,

This is with regard to your **Show Cause Notice** dated 15-07-2017 where we are being held responsible for a delay of 185 days of delay on the project. We fail to understand how we can be held accountable for the delay given that the circumstances that led to them were not in our control. Please find below our replies to the various points raised in the show cause notice.

Point 1. Delay on Account of Building Layout:

As mentioned in your Show Cause Notice, the delay in initiation of work at site took place because the lay out plan i.e. topographical survey provided to us by the Central University of Punjab did not match the actual conditions at site. There were significant discrepancies which required us to re-examine and adjust the location of the Phase 1A buildings.

We fail to understand how we can be held responsible for delays on account of an erroneous survey drawing given to us by the university.

The errors in the survey drawing required us to review and readjust was not something that could be done in isolation but needed to consider the master plan of the entire campus so that there is no adverse impact on the future development of the campus. This is a time consuming process that required a significant investment in terms of man hours to coordinate at site and revise all relevant drawings.

Point 2. Delay due to non-availability of Plinth Beam Structural Drawing and Point 3. Delay in plinth beam due to non-availability of structural drawing of slab and beam framing plans:

As per the approved protocol for the release of drawings at site, PSDA sends the drawings to EIL for review, approval and issuance to site. The final set of drawings that go to site are printed, signed and dispatched from our studio to EIL for forwarding only after we receive approval from EIL.

The structural drawings were sent to EIL in Late March and the first half of April for their inputs and review. Inputs were received for the VIP Guest House based on which the drawings were updated.

However these drawings had to be subsequently revised two more times between the months of May and July due to changes in the EIL structural team and consequent changes in their evaluation criteria. Methodologies that were agreed upon by earlier review teams in EIL were modified and changes were asked for in the design.

During this period of around three months (between May and July) since we received no feedback on any of the other buildings and it was therefore decided that all buildings would be revised as per inputs received for the VIP Guest House. These were submitted to EIL in middle of July.

During this period EIL was also in the process of establishing new systems that required all drawings to be uploaded on their server through their portal. This led to considerable coordination issues related to the submission of drawings to EIL since their system was not functioning. We have subsequently reverted to sending drawings via e-mail since we are unable to properly access and use their online portal.

The foundation details and framing plan at plinth level for 6 buildings except the P G Hostel (Men & Women) were approved under Code '1' or '2' by EIL before the kick-off meeting and hard copies for issuing to site were submitted on 25-7-2015. From what we were given to understand Code '1' or '2' approved drawings are sufficient to begin work at site while any necessary revisions/comments were being made could be made and sent subsequently. However of the 151 drawings approved under Code '1' or '2' that were issued to EIL only 11 were forwarded to the contractor

The repeated changes in the criteria for evaluation of Structural Drawings necessitated multiple revisions that also had an impact on the architectural and services drawings for the buildings. The design of the buildings submitted as per the approved DBR and the issues that have arisen were mainly based on differences of opinion on interpretation of code and best practices. We had tried to get some clarity on this matter during the preparation of the DBR but were unable to get any clarity on this issue.

We had tried to discuss these issues when in the 26th BAC meeting held on 1/9/2015 but were not allowed to present our case properly and had subsequently sent the university a letter with regards to the minutes of the meeting on 11/09/2015. A copy of the letter is enclosed.

We were under the impression that these issues had been subsequently resolved as we were asked to work on Phase 1B of the university.

Clarifications regarding the points mentioned in the Show Cause notice were also provided in our e-mail dated 10/10/2016 regarding the time extension for the contractor. A copy of the email is enclosed.

We have been proactively working with the university and EIL to ensure that the campus is completed properly and is of the highest standards and feel that it would not be fair to penalise us financially for delays that have occurred due to factors that are not in our control

We hope that this matter can be resolved in an amicable and fair manner.

This is in reference to the 26th BAC meeting held at Bathinda on 1/9/2015 and the subsequent Minutes of the Meeting issued.

During the meeting the blame for delay in issuing drawings to the contractor was placed on PSDA and it was suggested that the payments to PSDA be withheld to the tune of 10% of the total fees payable to us. This was done without allowing PSDA to explain our side of the issue. We would like to place our side of the matter before you for record and clarify the issue.

As per the approved protocol for the release of drawings at site, PSDA sends the drawings to EIL for review, approval and issuance to site. The final set of drawings that go to site are printed, signed and dispatched from our studio to EIL for forwarding only after we receive approval from EIL.

Details of the drawings sent to EIL & released at site as per record are enclosed. We have also enclosed a chart with details on the flow of drawings between our studio and EIL. This shows that we have been prompt in reverting to feedback from EIL.

The structural drawings were sent to EIL in late March and the first half of April for their inputs and review. Inputs were received for the VIP Guest House based on which the drawings were updated. However these drawings had to be subsequently revised two more times between the months of May and July due to changes in the EIL structural team and consequent changes in their evaluation criteria. Methodologies that were agreed upon by earlier review teams in EIL were modified and changes were asked for in the design.

During this period of around three months (between May and July) since we received no feedback on any of the other buildings and it was therefore decided that all buildings would be revised as per inputs received for the VIP Guest House. These were submitted to EIL in middle of July.

On 25/7/2015, 151 signed drawings were handed over to EIL for forwarding to the contractor. Of these, 12 drawings were issued to the contractor on 28/7/15.

During this period EIL was also in the process of establishing new systems that required all drawings to be uploaded on their server through their portal. This led to considerable coordination issues related to the submission of drawings to EIL since their system was not functioning. We have subsequently reverted to sending drawings via e-mail since we are unable to properly access and use their online portal.

The current issues related to the drawings were brought to our notice only a few days before the last BAC meeting. We have been working tirelessly to resolve the issues with EIL and ensure that the project does not suffer.

We would also like to put on record that our structural designer is extremely experienced having worked with us on government projects and also on projects for the Taj and ITC groups that have some of the most stringent audit procedures prevalent today.

The design of the buildings is as per the approved DBR and we are a bit perplexed as to why issues are being raised at this stage given that the drawings were submitted well in advance. The issues that have arisen are mainly based on differences of opinion on interpretation of code and best practices. We had tried to get some clarity on this matter during the preparation of the DBR but were unable to get any clarity on this issue.

The Central University of Punjab is an extremely important project to our studio. We have tirelessly worked towards ensuring that the project stays on track and is successfully implemented.

We were extremely hurt by the suggestion during the meeting questioning the competency of our team, our ability to deliver and be held fully responsible for the issues related to the release of drawings to the contractor, especially when it was suggested we be financially penalised for the delay even without being allowed to explain our point of view.

We are also extremely demoralised and saddened due to your refusal to review the work done for Phase 1A. We have put in considerable amount of work for the presentation with the intent to fast-track the design process as we were told that these buildings need to be taken up with urgency.

We have so far had an extremely productive relationship with all agencies concerned with the project due to which we have been moving ahead in an efficient and timely manner. The project is moving into the critical stage of implementation and its success entirely depends on the entire team's ability to function harmoniously and create an enabling environment. This would require an atmosphere of mutual goodwill, support, honesty and transparency from all parties concerned.

Working in an atmosphere where one has to be constantly on guard and defensive will only lead to conflict and endanger the success of the project. Any project of this scale has teething problems at this stage. Most of these issues have been resolved and we are moving ahead and making considerable progress.

We look forward to continuing to work on the project and working with you towards creating a world-class campus in Bathinda.

Refer various mails regarding the matter of time extension for the contractor.

Please find our reply regarding the Contractor Delay analysis / Hindrance chart sent to us below. Their explanation is as follows:

There are three main issues that we have been asked to comment upon:

- 1) **Delay in Layout of Building:** The delay was due to the incorrect survey that had been provided to us which required adjustment of the location of the buildings as per site conditions. This is a situation that was not in our control. Any decision regarding this issue should be jointly taken by EIL and CUPB.
- 2) **Delay in late issuing of RCC Structural Drawing of Foundation Detail & Delay due to late issuing of plinth beam drawings.:** The foundation details and framing plan at plinth level for 6 buildings except the P G Hostel (Men & Women) were approved under Code '1' or '2' by EIL before the kick-off meeting and hard copies for issuing to site were submitted on 25-7-2015. From what we were given to understand Code '1' or '2' approved drawings are sufficient to begin work at site while any necessary revisions/comments were being made could be made and sent subsequently.

However of the 151 drawings approved under Code '1' or '2' that were issued to EIL only 11 were forwarded to the contractor as per your e-mail. We cannot therefore comment on the delay because of this.

The delay in releasing the drawings for the foundations of the PG Hostels (Men and Women) and the Plinth Beam reinforcement details for all buildings was mainly due to the time taken by PSDA & EIL to arrive at a consensus regarding the structural design of the building.

The drawings of the foundation details for the P G Hostels for issuing to the contractor were sent to EIL on 1/10/2015 & 8/10/2015 as per our records. The contractor is however claiming a further delay of up to 19/10/2015, This will need to be clarified by EIL based on when the drawings were issued to the contractor.

Similarly for the Plinth beam details there is a difference between the dates on which the dates on which the drawings were issued to EIL by PSDA and the delay claimed by the contractor. This will need to be clarified by EIL. The details are given below:

M/s PSDA was appointed as Architect for planning and designing of the campus of CUPB at Bathinda vide an Agreement dated 14-09-2013 with CUPB. The scope of the services and the time schedule in which the services were to be provided was specified as per Clause 4.2 of the agreement. Subsequently, CUPB through its Project Management Consultant, M/s Engineers India Limited awarded the contract of construction of Phase-I-A works in July 2015. However, M/s PSDA failed to provide all the construction drawings to the Contractor through M/s EIL in July 2015 and many drawings were issued late, in instalments, leading to a delay in the execution of works. CUPB has been left with no option other than to extend the completion date of the project by almost 16 months.

M/s EIL (the PMC) has examined the issue of delay in the receipt of construction drawings from M/s PSDA up to the period of June 2016 and have confirmed that there was a delay of 185 days due to late issue of drawings by M/s PSDA. The following specific delays are noted:

- 1. Delay on account of Building Layout :** The setting out plan GFC drawings issued originally to the contractor on 28.07.2015 could not be executed at site as the layout of the plant furnished by client was at mismatch with the actual site available. The final corrected layout of the site could only be given to contractor on 17.09.2015. This led to a delay of 50 days.
- 2. Delay due to non-availability of plinth beam structural drawing:** The plinth beam structural drawings were issued by M/s EIL to the Contractor on 05.12.2015 due to late issue of the drawings by M/s PSDA. Due to this delay in availability of drawings, the contractor was not able to execute the structural work at site. The cumulative delay on this account is 128 days.
- 3. Delay in plinth beam due to non-availability of structural drawing of slab and beam framing plans:** M/s PSDA delayed the issue of First Floor framing

plan including beams & slabs and these drawings were released to Contractor on 31.01.2016. This resulted in delay in the construction of the structure and the cumulative delay on the account in the completion of the project is 185 days.

There were several other instances where due to discrepancy & incomplete drawings the work was held up at site. Apart from the above mentioned instances, there have been delays in the issue of other drawings also by M/s PSDA. It is likely that on examination of the status of issue of drawings after June 2016 further delays would be attributed to M/s PSDA.

Since it has been established that the delay in the completion of the Phase-I-A works is attributable to M/s PSDA on account of late issue of drawings, therefore as per clause 10 of the agreement between CUPB and M/s PSDA, liquidated damages of 0.5% per week are to be imposed in case of delay in the performance by M/s PSDA. You are therefore required to explain within 10 days of receipt of this letter as to why liquidated damages should not be levied on you in accordance with Clause 10 of the Agreement.
